The British Massacre Confirmed.

LONDON, March 10 .- The India Office has received a dispatch from the Earl of Elgin, viceroy of India, confirming reports of the disaster to the British column in the Abor territory under command of Capt. Maxwell, The dispatch says that on Feb. 27 a large party of tribesmen made an attack upon a detachment of Capt. Maxwell's guards composed of native troops and British officers at Bordak. The attack was almost a complete surprise and the ensu-

ing fight was brief and one-sided. The guards fought under cover as long as possible but were soon surrounded by the Abors, who outnumbered 5 to 1, and 27 of the British party were virtually butchered. The lines of communication with the British column have been broken, but it is known a party of 80 men of Capt. Maxwell's command are besieged in the stockade at Membo by an almost overwhelming force of tribesmen. A detachment of 230 men has been sent to the relief of the beleaguered party, but as yet no information has been received. It is believed this party will have hard fighting to do on its own account before its arrival at Membo. Three hundred additional native troops have been summoned into active service and these will be immediately sent to the assistance of the Membo relief detachment.
