Los Angeles, Cal., March 13 .- A dispatch from Tucson, Ariz., to the Herald Mexican bandits held up the says: stage which runs between Potam and Torin, on the Yaqui River, in Sonora, last Tuesday night, killing all of the six passengers. Among them was Filiberto Alverado, a wealthy Mexican, who owns a number of ranches along Guyamas were at once notified. Alverado and his wife had taken the stage from Potam to Torin, and the bandits no doubt thought he carried a large sum of money with him. The

stage carries very little mail, and rarely any money or valuables, so that Alverado must have been the mark for the bandits. The hold-up took towns, but just how the stage was attacked will never be known, as all of the pasesngers and driver were killed.
