INTERCOLONIAL OF A JAPANESE HERO

THE SPIRIT THAT IS ACTUATING THE MIKADO'S MEN.

Sanko, Takano, sergeant-major, special duty, belongs to the Second Company, Second Cavalry Regiment, Second Division. On a dark night in early April, soon after his regiment had reached the Yalu River, he and Lance-Corporal Shinobu Watanabe were sent out with a third man to ascertain the width and depth of the main stream of the river where it flows between two islands opposite Wiju. They crossed the first channel in a boat which the sergeant-major and the corporal left on the first island in charge of a third man. Then the two worked across the island to the main stream. The Russians occupied a little village on the opposite side, directly across from the place where Takano and Newfoundland, Watanabe struck the river. Takano saw that it would be very difficult to get across without attracting their attention. Ice was running in the river unequaled and the water was bitterly cold. Takano thought that if he tried to swim the bottom of the river, rising occas-
