Sons of England Issue Invitation to Woodstock and Ingersoll.

The regular meeting of British Lion Lodge, No. 52, of the Sons of England, was held in Forester Hall, at the corner of Dundas and English streets last evening, and invitations extended to the brethren of Woodstock and Ingersoll to visit here in the near future.

AUTHORITY TO FORM A COMMUNION ROLL

Will Be Asked by King Street Presbyterian Church.

At the regular meeting of the session of the King Street Presbyterian Church held last evening it was decided to present a petition to the Presbytery of London at its next conference, asking that special authority be given to form a communion roll in connection with the Hamilton Road Mission, and to organize it into a special congregation to be known as the Hamilton Road Presbyterian Church.

The petition is signed by forty-three members of the church and twenty-seven adherents. The Hamilton Road Mission is east of Egerton street, and is at present in charge of Rev. Mr. Smith, and under the supervision of the King Street session. The petition further asks that an ordained missionary be placed in charge of the mission, and that the session be authorized to hold a series of two-weeks special services, commencing Sunday, and to give communion on Sunday, March 14.

Rev. James Rollins, the moderator, presided.

SUDDEN DEATH OF MR. JAMES ADAMS

A Well-Known Citizen Succumbs to Septic Pleurisy.

Mr. James R. Adams died from septic pleurisy at his residence, 458 Simcoe street, yesterday afternoon.

The late Mr. Adams had been ill but a short time, and his sudden death will be a great shock to many. He was in his 50th year, and had been employed for the last three years in the customs department of the postoffice. Prior to this he worked in the G. T. R. freight offices for twenty years.

He was a public-spirited man, was a staunch Reformer all his life, and was a consistent member of the Wellington Street Methodist Church.

Sixteen years ago he married Sadie Edgcombe, sister of Messrs. R. G. and W. H. Edgcombe, of this city. The deceased is survived by his mother, wife and daughter, Madeline, two sisters, Jennie, at home, and Mrs. John Jeffrey, of 419 Simcoe street, and four brothers, Joseph, of New York; Elijah, of Chicago; William, of St. Thomas, and Walter, of this city. The funeral arrangements have not been decided yet, but they will be of a private nature.

Egerton Street.

The Egerton street crossing was then brought up.

Chairman Scott stated that the crossing had also been visited by the city solicitor, and that the city had no objection to the crossing being raised to the level of the street.

He had received no notice of any desire to go into this question, said Mr. Meredith.

Notices were sent out, said Chairman Scott.

Asks for Time.

"However, I would ask that this matter be laid over in view of these circumstances," said Mr. Meredith.

Attorney Pope made a proposition on behalf of the Grand Trunk that the sets of kates be installed, half the cost be found by the company, and half by the city.

"I talked this over with Mr. Brownlee this morning, and we agreed to make this offer," said Mr. Pope.

"You understand that we have been negotiating going on between the company and the city regarding the raising of the grade of the crossing, and we have been unable to reach an agreement," said Mr. Pope.

"The situation is unchanged, and I see no reason for placing the cost on the companies," Mr. Saunders said in conclusion.

"The only difference is that a number of people have been killed," said Chairman Scott.

More Level Crossings.

Then the level crossings in Dutton, West Lorne and Rodney over the M. C. R. and Pere Marquette were taken up.

Mr. O. W. Saunders, on behalf of the M. C. R., pointed out that conditions on this road were no different than years ago when they were inspected by the Government engineers.

A number of the accidents were due largely to carelessness of the pedestrians and drivers.

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MICHIGAN BARS THE CLAIRVOYANT

Measure Passed By Legislature That Hits Spiritualists Hard.

Lansing, Mich., Feb. 25.—By a vote of 65 to 21, the Stevenson bill, which prohibits the practice of palmistry, clairvoyance, astrology or fortune-telling by cards, or other devices, for money or gain, passed the House this afternoon.

It was only after a long discussion that the bill was passed. The occasion gave the members their first opportunity for rhetorical display, and Representative Flowers, of A. Miller, Judge Hecker and D. G. F. Warner, among others, got into the game with a zest.

Spiritualists Included.

Representative Gray, of Lansing, offered an amendment excluding spiritualists from the provisions of the bill.

"That measure was promptly killed," Representative Flowers declared. "That measure is a measure to protect the public from the frauds of the clairvoyant."

"I do not know that it is any worse for people to consult a clairvoyant than it is for them to consult a fortune teller," Representative Miller declared.
