May See Chancellor. Berlin, Feb. 8 .- Viscount Haldane the British secretary for war, accompanied by his brother, arrived here to day. The aim of his visit is ostensibly urely private, but it is altogether probable that he will take the opporanity of discussing Anglo-German reations with Dr. Von Bethmann-Holleg, the imperial chancellor, and Herr Von Kiderlen-Waechter, the secretary of state for foreign affairs, and of learning from them on what conditions to the policy of protection. Germany is inclined to listen to overures for their betterment.
