BORDEN CONFUSED SAYS GUARDIAN

INAUGURATED SUNDAY Great English Daily Declares That His Speech Was Inconsistent.

BEST ALLIANCE SYSTEM

London, Dec. 6. - The Manchester Guardian's editorial recalls Gladstone's prophecy of over fifty years ago, that eventually the colonies would be prepared to go beyond the bare idea of self defence.

It continues: "The home parliament must reserve its right to withhold its consent to any proposal that threatens further to resist its control; but as we value our own rights of self-government, so we must respect colonial rights. If it should appear either that the imperial Government had taken sides on a question which is greatly controverted between political parties in Canada or had made improper statements to Canadian representatives, most of us would hold that injustice had been done to colonial rights.
