"The point is that the board pays a man to punish pupils," said Trustee Shaw at the meeting of No. 1 committee of the board of education Friday, referring to the fact that W. T. T. There were no increases in salary voted to any of the city teachers at the meeting of No. 1 committee of the board of education Friday. Ald, Greenlees moved that the communication of the male teachers protesting against Dr. Shaw's reflections be filed, and it was decided to make no increases in salary at present.

"I have been accused," said Dr. Shaw, "of singling out one teacher as the only one deserving of an increase. One member of the board has gone so far as to say that an investigation should be made. I have based my criticism on the results of the honor matriculation examinations, which I regard as very important. In one department, mathematics, there were no less than ten students winning honors; five firsts, three seconds, and two thirds. In no other department were there more than three honors won, nor more than

Matriculation Report. Secretary McElheran pointed out that the honor matriculation results in the annual report were not com-

"Why is the report published, then? asked Dr. Shaw.
"I don't think that it is fair for the teachers to ask for increases in the face of such an unfavorable report," said Dr. Shaw.

Dr. Mugan said that in the question of increasing the teachers' salaries the board should be unanimous before taking action. If the salaries at present were large enough to retain an efficient staff, all right. If they were not high enough, he was in favor of paying more, if it was necessary, in order to retain the services of the present efficient staff.


