WILL LOSE LICENSES IF LIQUOR SALES CONTINUE

Unusual Action Taken to Save Men Working on Walker-ton Contract.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Walkerton, Jan. 29.—A provision of a clause of the liquor licence act not often carried into force, was made active today by a direct order from the Provincial Secretary.

There has been under construction for a year or more a dam about a mile above the town. Some trouble has been caused to the contractors by the men getting drunk. Recently a new steel bridge has been started over the Saugeen.

The men had not been paid for a long time, and on Sunday they quit work, but the same day were paid up to Jan. 1. A few of them got into a wrangle and made some disturbances.

It is thought that as a result of this an application was made to the Government, and today all the hotels got orders that they should sell no liquor to men working on either construction under penalty of losing their licenses.

SAYS HE DIDN'T KNOW HE WAS MARRIED

Detroit, Jan. 29.—Alleging that he was intoxicated and did not know of his marriage until two weeks after the ceremony, Louis Brock has filed a petition in the Wayne circuit court asking for divorce from Elizabeth Brock.

In his petition Brock recites that he was married Dec. 5, 1912, in Windsor, by P. C. Cameron, of Bruce Avenue Baptist Church; that he became drunk the day before, and had no idea that he had engaged in a marriage ceremony until one day two weeks later a woman came to his residence and insisted that she was his wife.

HELD FOR BIGAMY

Josephine Lucier Is in the Hands of Police at Windsor.
