



## TRIBE STOP YOUNG WIN STREAK OF HUMP'S CREW

Schaefer Hitting Star of Day With Four Singles and Triple On Five Trips To Plate.

KITCHENER, July 3.—Buzz Wetzel's crew stopped the Kitchener offensive tonight, when they waded into the Beavers and easily defeated them 19 to 3. For quite a while it looked as if the Longhorns were going to shut out the locals, but in the final three innings Doc Bullard eased up, and the locals touched him for seven of the nine hits they got and earned three runs.

The London team played nice ball on the field, Feder contributing the only home run he has ever made. He was the first to get on base, and the Beavers got some bad base-ball off their chests, and chalked up no less than five misplays.

Schaefer was the hitting star of the day, having four singles and a triple in five trips to the plate. He was rather a lucky one, as Burrell misjudged it, and the ball went over his head to the fence.

London tallied in the second when Schaefer dropped Stimpson's fly back of second. Blake and Schaefer then singled in succession to send Stimpson home. To start the third, Stimpson was hit by a pitched ball, Blake sacrificed, and then Schaefer uncorked his three-base swifter, and he scored on Mackey's sacrifice fly.

In the fifth more runs pattered across the plate. With one down, Blake singled and Schaefer beat out a hit to second. Mackey struck out, but Wimble hit for a sack, scoring Blake. Wimble went to second on the throw in, and when Berry tried to get him there he threw a wild one, and Schaefer tallied. Boye singled to right, scoring Wimble, and he tallied when Hindt threw Feder's grounder over Anderson's head.

Two more were added in the sixth on Butters' and Stimpson's singles. Blake's sacrifice and Schaefer's single. The last London tally came in the seventh, when Hindt fumbled Wimble's grounder. He went down in the Beavers' infield out, and tallied on Feder's base knock to left.

Hockey's single gave the Beavers their first in the seventh, while in the eighth singles by Berry, Hindt and Mostade added another. Their final run came in the ninth on Anderson's single. Feder's mess-up of Burrell's grounder and Berry's second single sealed the win.
