New York Dairy Market. NEW YORK, July 30. -Butter - Steady, unchanged; receipts, 15,000.

Eggs - Nominally unchanged; business held up by strikes of truckdrivers; receipts, 2,122.

CATTLE MARKETS. Cables Unchanged - United States Markets Are About Steady.

LONDON, July 30. -London cables are steady at 10 to 10 1/2 per lb. dressed weight; refrigerator beef is quoted at 9 1/2 to 10 per lb.

Toronto Live Stock. TORONTO, July 30. -Receipts of live stock at the City Market as reported by the railways, since last Friday were 54 carloads, composed of 752 cattle, 409 hogs, 612 sheep and lambs and 277 calves.

There was little doing in export cattle, no good choice loads being on sale.

One load of 120-lb. cattle was reported by Crawford & Fleming, being sold at \$4.80. Thomas Castle sold one choice quality of 220 lbs. by Fraser T. McGillivray of Kenilworth, at \$4.30 per cwt., but few buyers being such a price.

Best loads of butchers offered sold at \$3.50 to \$4.00 per cwt. Choice common mixed loads \$3.50 to \$3.75; cows \$2.50 to \$3.00; canners \$1.50 to \$2.00.

Feeders and Stockers. There is little doing in feeders and stockers, also choice loads being on sale for a few of good quality, but farmers seem to be generally holding out for present time to pay any attention to the cattle market. Common stockers were quoted at \$2.00 to \$2.50 per cwt. Light weights of good quality, 800 to 900 lbs. each, \$2.50 to \$3.00.

Milch Cows. Trade in milch and springers was somewhat a little better, especially for the latter, between 20 and 40 sold from \$3.00 to \$4.00 each, but few reached the latter figure, as will be seen by quotations of sales given.

Veal Calves. Prices were about steady for veal calves, selling at \$1.50 to \$2.00 per cwt.

Sheep and Lambs. Export ewes sold at \$4.50 per cwt.; butcher sheep of choice quality, many of which were yearlings, sold at \$2 per cwt.; lambs sold at \$2.50 to \$3.00 per cwt., or 1/2 to 1/2 per lb.

Hogs. The run of hogs was light, Mr. Harris quotes prices steady at \$1.50 for select, and \$1.60 for lights and fats.

East Buffalo Cattle Market. EAST BUFFALO, July 30. -Cattle - Receipts, 200 head; steady; prices unchanged.

Veals - Receipts, 50 head; slow and steady; \$2 to \$2.50.

Hogs - Receipts, 400 head; fairly active; plus, the lower; others steady; heavy, \$1.50 to \$2.00; medium, \$1.50 to \$2.00; light, \$1.50 to \$2.00; roughs, \$1.50 to \$2.00.

Sheep and lambs - Receipts, 67; market steady. About all sold. Sheep sold at \$2.50 to \$3.00; cuts at \$2.50; lambs at \$2.50 to \$3.00.

Chicago Live Stock. CHICAGO, July 30. -Cattle - Receipts, about 300; market steady; common to prime steers, \$4.50 to \$5.00; cows, \$2 to \$2.50; butchers, \$2 to \$2.50; calves, \$1 to \$1.50; stockers and feeders, \$1 to \$1.50.

Hogs - Receipts, about 14,000; market steady to better; good to prime heavy, \$2.50 to \$3.00; medium to good heavy, \$2.50 to \$3.00; butchers, \$2.50 to \$3.00; light, \$2.50 to \$3.00; roughs, \$2.50 to \$3.00.
