MANUFACTURERS DRIVE TO END SMUGGLING EVIL

Executive of C. M. A. Starts War To Stop Unfair Competition.

APPEALS TO OTTAWA
Association Charges Goods Coming Through Customs Are Often Undervalued.

Canadian Press Despatch.
Montreal, Feb. 8.—The statement that hundreds of thousands of dollars worth of goods were being smuggled into this province every year, especially in such lines as silk goods, was made at a meeting of the executive of the Montreal branch of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association held here this afternoon.

A similar difficulty complained of was that imported goods were being entered for customs duties and appraised at values much less than those obtaining in the United States. It was pointed out that this system of evading the customs and making a dumping market of Canada constituted a condition of affairs which Canadian manufacturers could not compete and trade in some of the lines affected was being completely destroyed.

The executive decided consequently to start immediately a campaign to secure information in individual cases, not only with regard to smuggling but also as to the under-valuation of imported goods. Information thus obtained would be sent to the Dominion government.

OBSTACLES TO OVERCOME

The extension of trade preference by Australia to Canada along the same lines as that which now exists between Australia and Great Britain, is a possibility which is likely to take place in the near future, providing Canada makes herself known to the world as a country worthy of its trade, according to George Clarke, advertising manager of the McClellan Manufacturing Company, speaking to members of the Round Table Club last night at the Blue Dragon Tearooms.

"Australia should prove a great field for Canadian trade," Mr. Clarke declared. "Great Britain now enjoys approximately 50 per cent of the business, and Canada can only lay claim to about one-eighth of one per cent. Although Canada buys little from both Australia and New Zealand, it is a much greater consumer than is actually shown by statistics, because great quantities of yarn and other products purchased from England originally come from Australia.

According to Mr. Clarke there are still many obstacles to overcome before successful trade conditions exist between the two countries. The Australians are a little prejudiced to Canadians because they do not consider citizens of this country as British as they are. This can be overcome easily, according to Mr. Clarke, by extensive advertising on the part of Canada.

"Canada is not well known to both New Zealand and Australia, and few people of those countries realize the vast wealth of Ontario, the workshop of Canada. This situation can only be overcome by advertising ourselves," Mr. Clarke asserted.

"Although Canadian trade commissions there are doing splendid work, there is really too much ground for them to cover. Australia covers an area even greater than Canada, and New Zealand is separate and distinct from Australia again. Canada can increase her trade by going to these countries, by looking over the ground, and by advertising.

No indent house in Australia can satisfactorily represent a Canadian manufacturer of merchant. Trade with Australia in tropical fruits should be increased in order that this country might in return increase her exports.

Mr. Clarke gave a short outline of the social conditions and customs of the Australians and New Zealanders. His lecture was concluded with interesting illustrations of the points of interest in the principal cities and districts of Australia.

OPPOSITION WILL OPEN FIGHT WITH SINCLAIR'S REPLY
Liberal Leader Will Speak Tuesday On Speech From Throne.

DOHERTY PREPARES

Toronto, Feb. 8.—The first real onslaught upon the Ferguson administration will be directed Tuesday next, when Ontario's Liberal chieftain, W. E. N. Sinclair, K.C., the fighting member for South Ontario, delivers his reply to the speech from the throne.

The Liberal group will assemble in caucus in the forenoon, when the policies of the party throughout the session will be determined.

While the opposition may be considered small in size, it will not be lacking in strength, and there is every indication that Premier Ferguson and his associates will learn, much to their discomfort perhaps, that they will have to hew close to the line.

Doherty Sounds Call.
The Hon. Manning Doherty, Progressive leader, has sounded the call for another business gathering of his party Tuesday morning also, to make final preparations for their second attack in the afternoon upon the "powers that be."

Whether they be United Farmer or progressive in principle, the "supporters of the late government," as their leader chooses to call them, will remain as a unit during the East. Jack Freeborn, member for East Middlesex, and party whip, states quite confidently that there is going to be no bolting to the old-time parties, as recommended not long since by the prime minister.

In the meanwhile, however, and until the provincial Progressive convention in June, the Doherty group will style themselves as "supporters of the late government." Identification of the name "Progressive" will be left for the convention.

House Adjourned.
Journeying back to their homes tonight after the House adjourned on Monday, many of the Tory members from rural constituencies bemoaned the fact that the O. T. A. issue had been dragged into the arena so early, or in fact at all.

As one of the members pointed out to The Advertiser: "It's all very well for Col. Currie to talk about a referendum, but he does not represent a rural riding."

Another Tory caucus to consider this leading problem has been set for early in the week, when it is expected that the government will define a definite policy. There are many Tory members who state quite freely that while they will support a government measure, they will not rally to the call from Col. Currie or any other private member, Conservative or otherwise.

Strike Committees.
The Ontario Legislature sat less than half an hour this afternoon, the greater portion of the time being devoted toward another jangle between Premier Ferguson and the Hon. Manning Doherty, Progressive leader, the latter complaining as to the reckless manner in which the members of the government introduced bills out of order and otherwise disregard generally the rules of the House.

Several petitions from various municipalities and private members were "laid out the table" as a matter of "red tape."

The following "striking" committee was appointed: Messrs. Ferguson, Henry, Price, Black, McHardy, Ireland, Welch, McEwen, Pinard, Sam Clark, McWhinney, Biggs, Doherty and Lethbridge. The first eight named are members of the government, the next three are Liberals and the last three are Progressives.

CANAL SECTION CONTRACT TO BE LET IN MAY, CLAIMED

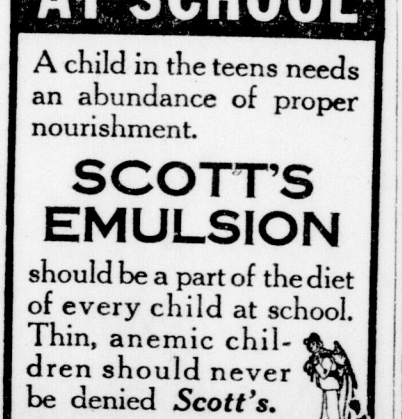

GARRETT—McLAUGHLAN.

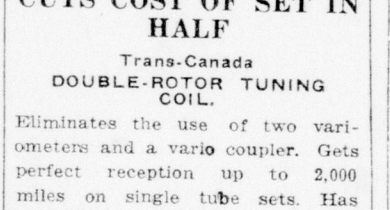
