BRITISH COLUMBIA TIMBER

To Be Further Utilized by the Erection of Large and Modern Mills.

Mr. Hammill Leaves for the East to Purchase Necessary Machinery.

Within the next day or two, the incorporation of the Toronto Milling and Manufacturing Company, with a capital stock of \$1,000,000 in one thousand shares, will be announced through the official Gazette.

The project which brings the new company into existence, and which was referred to several months ago in the COLONIST, has been thus far developed mainly through the efforts and exertions of Mr. John White, ex-M.P., and T. J. Hammill, two gentlemen whose names will be found among those of the first trustees.

The capital to be utilized is principally from Toronto and British Columbia, and the capitalists interested are Mr. White and Mr. Hammill, Mr. John and Mr. H. H. Strathy and Mr. John Davidson. Of course, the best of the mill will be in Victoria; while the mills will be located with the homes of the mill-men, at the new city of Sidney, Saanich district.

The mill site has already been selected, close to the Sidney wharf, where the land now calls regularly on both upward and downward slopes, and the mill will be erected on a dead low tide—a depth sufficient to accommodate the quantity of water which the mill grounds include 30 acres of the townsite land, and over 50,000 acres of magnificent timber will be made tributary to this mill.

The preliminaries of incorporation having been arranged, Mr. Hammill goes west to select machinery of the latest and best design. This will require the smaller and first mill will be completed and ready for business. A second and more important building will follow with a capacity of 30,000 feet per day, and capable of employing from 100 to 200 loggers and mill men.

The advantages possessed by Sidney, and which, the mill men believe, will be the best, were the excellent facilities for shipping timber, and the fact that the wharf and mill are on the new road is put in operation. The same of Sidney lumber, which has been hitherto, allied industries are beginning to cluster at the new city of Sidney.

In addition to the new mill, it is understood to be the intention of the Toronto syndicate to erect a large sawmill at Alberni. This project is as yet in its incipient stages, however.

VICTORIA MARKETS.

Drop in Oregon Flour—Fruit in the Market and Expected to Arrive.

Successing the holiday celebration there has been a little feeling of quiet in commercial circles, but retailers report that business is picking up considerably, and it is thought the June trade will be good. A certain amount of complaint is still made about money being tight, but it is easier to procure than it was some time past. In breadstuffs there is a feeling of uncertainty, owing to the action of the Oregon millers in reducing the wheat price, and it is thought further reductions will follow. This is in face of some heavy stocks being held locally. Shorts and feed are unchanged and in poor demand. In provisions there is not much change. Large shipments of butter have been received of late from the California market, and the price is a cent or two lower than a week. Manitoba dairy butter has not yet put in an appearance. A certain amount of complaint is still made about money being tight, but it is easier to procure than it was some time past.
