ANOTHER INSTANCE

The town of Staunton, Virginia, is quoted as an illustration of the advantages derived from conducting the affairs of a city as one would conduct those of a large business concern. Staunton does not adopt the commission plan in full, because an article in the constitution of the state made it necessary for each city to have an aldermanic board. The people, however, went as far as they could and abolished the old system of civic committees having charge of the various departments of the city government. A general manager was appointed who was given entire charge and control of all the executive work of the city in its various departments, and full control of the heads of departments and employees of the city. He was also clothed with authority to make all contracts for labor and supplies, and to perform all the administrative and executive work previously performed by the several standing committees, except the finance ordinance and auditing committees. A very able man appears to have been elected as the first general manager, for at the end of the first year his salary was increased \$500. The people pronounced the new system a complete success, and say that it has produced better results than were anticipated by its most enthusiastic supporters.

GRAPHIC'S COMPETITION.

The large trout are commencing to run up the Restigouche river and today three trout have been sent in to the Graphic's competition. The longest one, weighing something over five pounds, was caught in a net and is not eligible to enter the competition. The other two, one sent by Mr. Thos. Wran, weighs four pounds and nine ounces. The other caught at Tide Head by W. L. Goodman, weighs three

pounds, ten ounces.
