ACCOUNTING OFFICE AT CAMPBELLTON

I. C. R. Men to Inaugurate New System

The "Divisional System" of accounting which is used on many of the leading railways in Canada and the United States has been formally adopted on the I. C. R. The accounting department in the past has been directly managed by the general offices in Moncton but the new system will do away with this and several branches along the road have been established.

An office has also been installed here and is in charge of Mr. F. J. King, formerly of Moncton who has as his assistants Messrs. Graham Swetnam and O. R. Thibideau who are also from Moncton.

The office at Lewis is in charge of Mr. J. J. Belanger and Mr. William Walsh, of Moncton has also been transferred there and left last week to assume his new duties.

PROTECTION FOR FOX INDUSTRY IN QUEBEC

Provisions of Hon. Mr. Devlin's Bill—His References to The Business Here

Quebec, Nov. 27.—Hon. Mr. Devlin's bill for the protection of foxes and other fur-bearing animals kept in captivity prohibits strangers from approaching the enclosures of farms for fur-bearing animals beyond a distance of twenty-five yards under a penalty not exceeding \$50 and not less than \$5, and in default of imprisonment not exceeding three months and not less than one month.

A heavier fine is fixed by the new law for anyone who shall pass within the enclosure where the animals are kept, who shall climb over or break or cut through the enclosure. For this offence the fine is at a maximum of \$100 and a minimum of \$50 or imprisonment of not more than six and not less than two months.

The law also permits proprietors or care-takers of such farms to kill any dog which larks about the enclosures annoying or terrifying the animals, providing, however, that such dog is not accompanied by its owner or in care of some person.

Mr. Devlin, in speaking on the bill, pointed out that immense fortunes had been made in the fox farming industry in Prince Edward Island and in New Brunswick. The Hon. Mr. Dalton of the Prince Edward Island government, claimed to have made \$40,000 a year out of a fox farm, and had given an option for \$800,000 for its purchase. Absolute quiet and protection on private property from intrusion by strangers or dogs was necessary for successful breeding, and the province of New Brunswick had a special act providing for such protection.

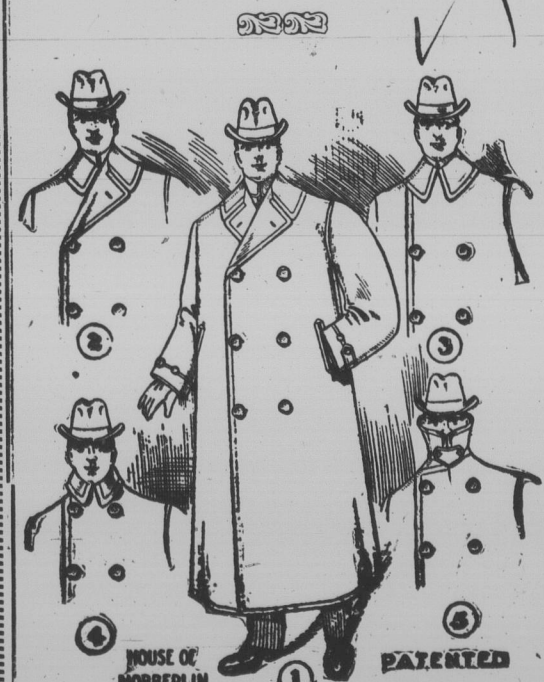
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
