SCENIC ROUTE THROUGH SARNIA TO BE A PROVINCIAL ROAD

A resolution asking the provincial government to take immediate steps to convert the road from Wndsor to Goderich via Sarnia, into a provincial highway was adopted by the Lambton county council at the closing meeting of the January session on Saturday.

The resolution, which was pro-

posed by Reeve Nichoras Sitter of Bosanquet and seconded by Reeve A. Sparman of Forest, reads as follows
Whereas the scenic route from Windsor to Grand Bend and Goder ich, via Sarnia, and through Lamb ton county and coming north from Windsor along the shore of Lake St. Clair and river St. Clair, is one the greatest natural assets of the

province and.
"Whereas the present means of communication between St. Clair river points, Lake Huron points, Lake St. Clair points and the lower Detroit river points, such as Windsor, Walkerville and Sandwich are most unsatisfactory, and : "Whereas the opening of the pro-

posed Detroit river bridge will greatly augument the tourist and other traffic through Ontario, and :

"Whereas it seems opportune that the communication through the St. district and along Lake Huron should be improved therefore be it resolved by the county council of the county of Lambton in council assemby petition the honorable, the minis-ter of highways of Ontario, to take


