The enemy burnt their ammunition before evacuating the stronghold. Refugees of the enemy who have been hiding in the adjoining forests and villages, continue to come in and surrender. The natives say that the number of Russians who were carried on litters through Feng-Wang-Cheng on May 2 amount to 800. It i believed that the total casualties of the enemy exceeded 3,000.
