CAPTAIN BUDD DUNHAM Digby, June 11.-Capt. Budd Dun-

nam, one of the best known ship captains in Western Nova Scotia, died at his home in Barton, Digby Co., at 8 o'clock last night, aged 78 years. One of the most remarkable features of his career was the fact that during his entire forty-eight years as master of sailing vessels he never lost a man under his command. He had his left arm broken by being thrown over the wheel on a voyage to Bar-badoes, and had it amputated in Yar-mouth by the late Dr. Webster in 1860. On Feb. 26, 1852, he married Mary Ann Warner, daughter of William Warner, of Blythe, England.


