WELLAND CANAL ENLARGEMENT.
NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

SPECIAL TENDERS addressed to the undersigned and endorsed "Tender for the Welland Canal" will be received at this office until the 1st instant, at the Eastern and Western Docks on MONDAY, the 11th day of JANUARY, 1886, for raising the walls of the locks, walls, etc., and increasing the height of the banks of that part of the Welland Canal between Port Dalhousie and Thorold, and for deepening the Neutral Level between Thorold and Hume's Head, near Humberside.

The work, throughout, will be let in Sections. Maps and general location, together with plans and descriptive specifications, can be obtained at this office on and after MONDAY, the 11th day of JANUARY next (1886), where printed forms of tender can be obtained. A list class of information relative to the works north of Allsburg will be furnished by the Resident Engineer's Office, Thorold; and for works south of Allsburg, J. A. Parsons, Esq., may be consulted. The tenders will be submitted to the Resident Engineer, Z. C. Morris, of Welland.

Contractors are requested to bear in mind that tenders will not be considered unless made strictly in accordance with the printed forms, and, in the case of firms, except there are attached the actual signatures the nature of the corporation and place of residence of each member of the same; and further, an accepted bank cheque for the amount of Two Thousand Dollars, and one-half according to the intent of the law on the section—except among the respective bidders, which sum shall be retained if the party tendering declines entering into contract for the work, at the rates stated in the offer submitted.

The amount required in each case will be stated on the form of tender.

The cheque or money thus sent in will be returned to the respective parties whose tenders are not accepted.
