

to our mission. A work permit is not required for employment with embassies but such opportunities are rare.

When vacancies occur in our Embassy, preference is given to hiring permanent members of the locally-engaged staff, followed by qualified spouses.

There are any number of volunteer activities available, particularly in the non-white sector.

Opportunities for employment, while limited because of the preference for hiring Tanzanians, do exist. There are more choices for persons willing to accept Tanzanian wages or, at least, salaries which are lower than those they might expect in Canada.

Work permits are required by expatriates working in Tanzania. The employer usually assists in securing it. Spouses should bring a good supply of curriculum vitae and passport photos for the lengthy administrative procedures which precede the actual employment.

Qualified teachers at both primary and secondary levels stand a good chance of getting a full-time or supplementary position at the International School. One should write well in advance to: The Headmaster, International School, P.O. Box 265, Dar-es-Salaam. Another English-speaking possibility is the Adult Education Centre (Lumumba Street) which occasionally needs part-time teachers in various fields. If interested, contact the Resident Tutor or the Public Relations Officer.

Those who speak French fluently may find teaching jobs at the École Française de Dar-es-Salaam. Write to : Directeur de l'École Française, P.O. Box 2183, Dar-es-Salaam. There might also be openings at the Alliance Française.

Anyone interested in tutoring privately might contact the above schools.

Teachers of musical instruments, and especially of voice, are always needed at the Music Conservatoire of Tanzania. The Conservatoire prepares for the examinations of the Associate Board of the Royal School of Music, London, England.

Occasionally there are teaching positions open at the university, especially in scientific fields and English writing skills. For political reasons expatriate teachers are generally not hired to teach social sciences. Getting oneself hired can be very time-consuming. Even if the department needs a teacher it may not have funds to cover the salary. If the department does pay the salary, it will be
