sentatives of the Canadian people we can down it forever we shall be performing a service to the Canadian nation.

I think all hon. members who have participated in the debate and who have brought forward all the arguments that could be used for or against such a contention. I agree with the hon, member for Stanstead that there will be no occasion hereafter to say that the decision which is to be made on this resolution is an obiter dictum. It is a thing which will have been argued and which will have been considered and about which the will and judgment of the representatives of the whole of the Canadian people will have registered their finding. May it be a finding that will endure.

Another objection is: Oh, yes, we want fairness, we want justice, but be careful; it is going to cost \$10,000,000 to give it to you. It is going to cost \$10 million to give Quebec that justice which Ontario is so anxious Quebec should have, but about which they want references to the courts; they want referenda to the population; they want the application of municipal law. All this is nice talk. "We want you to have that, but just try this, or that or the other thing before you get it; and in the meantime, of course, we will have", according to the hon. member for Broadview (Mr. Church), "another census, and we will try to see if you cannot do with a little less than we are so anxious to have you get, provided that you do not get it now".

I am glad that officially the Progressive Conservative party is taking the position that it is fair that Quebec should have this representation. I am glad and I think it will be helpful to national unity that the party go on record as taking that position. But I hope that it will not only do so only in words written into Hansard, that it will be not only a line of convenient pronouncement, but a line of actual conduct to be followed. I agree with the hon, member for Stanstead that it would be a more healthy situation if the party to which he belongs could get some representation in the constituencies of my province. It may be unfortunate that they cannot do so, but it is not my conduct that is the cause of that unfortunate result. I hope that the language used by the hon. member for Stanstead will be translated into action by the members of the party to which he belongs. It is by actions and only by actions that they can hope to win support from the constituencies of my province.

I think, Mr. Speaker, that this resolution has now been sufficiently debated and that the time has come when the question can be put to the members of this assembly.
