they place an extra pressure on households that rely on retirement incomes. How, in the name of all honesty, can the minister justify allowing the oil industry to grab another 10 per cent in a price increase this Thursday, while saying to 50 per cent of those Canadians who rely on retirement incomes that their incomes will be restricted, in terms of cost of living increases, to 6 per cent and 5 per cent?

Hon. Allan J. MacEachen (Deputy Prime Minister and Minister of Finance): Madam Speaker, I believe that the Prime Minister has already explained the nature of the agreement that exists affecting the energy industry. I do not think that I can add anything further to that aspect of the question.

I would tell the hon. member that, as far as recipients of old age security are concerned, where these recipients are in receipt of the guaranteed income supplement, that guaranteed income supplement will be fully indexed at whatever the rate of inflation happens to be. In addition to that, any amount that would be lost to them as a result of the reduction from 11 per cent to 6 per cent will be made up under the special compensation to recipients of the guaranteed income supplement so that no pensioner in need will be affected by this particular action of the government.

Hon. Allan Lawrence (Durham-Northumberland): Madam Speaker, my question is directed to the Solicitor General. Could the Solicitor General confirm or deny the rumour that the gentleman known as Mr. Igor Gouzenko, to whom this country and the western world owe so very, very much, has died and is being buried here in Ottawa, today?

Hon. Bob Kaplan (Solicitor General): Madam Speaker, I received numerous press inquiries before the question period on this subject. I have had inquiries made, and I hope to be able to have that information and make it public shortly, if, indeed, I can confirm or deny that rumour.
