Hon. Flora MacDonald (Minister of Employment and Immigration): Mr. Speaker, one of the programs the Government has brought in is Challenge '86. This year we will have some 60,000 applications before us for jobs for young people. Yesterday the spokesman for the New Democratic Party rose in the House and completely derided Challenge '86, which will offer hope and opportunity to some 100,000 young people. He said that that program was not a benefit to young people. I assure the Leader of his Party that young people across the country will find it beneficial. It is one of a number of initiatives which we are taking.

Hon. Edward Broadbent (Oshawa): Mr. Speaker, I say to the Minister and to the Prime Minister that there are still many Canadians who would like to take the word of politicians.

Mr. Mulroney: This is what is happening across the country, and we are going to cause youth unemployment to continue to go down, with government working—

Some Hon. Members: Oh, oh!

Some Hon. Members: Hear, hear!
