The President of the Swiss Confederation, M. Schultess, likewise laid marked emphasis upon the principles of liberty in his address given at the banquet which followed the academic ceremony.

It is probable that the centenary celebrations constituted the largest and most important gathering of representative university people held in Europe since the Hitler Government began to direct the policies of German education.

University representatives from the following countries were present : Algeria, Australia, Austria, Belgium (Prof. Piccard, the celebrated balloonist) Canada, Czechoslovakia, Denmark, England, France, Germany, Greece, Hungary, Ireland, Italy, Lithuania, Mexico, Netherlands, Palestine, Poland, Roumania, Scotland, South Africa, Spain, Sweden, United States of America, Yugoslavia.

The message of congratulation addressed to the Senate of the University by McGill was handed to the Rector by Laurence C. Tombs, Arts '24, M.A. '26, Member of the League of Nations Secretariat, Geneva. McGill was the only Canadian university represented.

The day closed with a gala performance of the opera "Orpheus" by Gluck, with the Norwegian singer Segrïd Onégin in the title role.

Within a week after he had attended the Zurich celebrations, Dr. Kohlrausch, Rector of Berlin University, retired from office (see attached cutting from "The Times").
