their clergy should be stripped of their maintenance, and the whole people made fubject to laws enacted by an affembly, from which they were to be excluded, and in the election of whole members they were to be deprived of all fhare? Upon what ground or pretence is it afferted, That a claufe, which expressly takes, away from the parish priests their legal title to tithes of the lands held by protestants, and which our great crownlawyers declared the king could not deprive them of by his prerogative, can be faid to establish popery, and grant only a precarious toleration to the church of England?-But I will not anticipate what will come more properly into difcuffion, when the act itself is confidered.

The death of the bishop of Quebec, which happened in the year 1760, brought on the confideration of the appointment of a successfor; which was certainly a matter of much importance and
