## EUROPEAN CROPS **NOT PROMISING**

Reported Rain Damage in Lambs Lower-Hogs Firm Canadian West Another Bullish Factor.

CHICAGO. Aug. 20.—Wheat today was dominated largely by the foreign situation, bullish cables imparting strength that lasted thruout the session until the final hour when the market weakened somewhat on profittaking sales. At the end prices were 1-4c to 3-8c net higher. Corn closed at a net advance of 1-8c to 1-2c. Oats declined 1-4c to 3-8c. Provisions were 2 1-2c to 17 1-2c higher.

The cables brought news of wheat shorts covering at Liverpool, told of rather unfavorable crop conditions in Germany, France and Hungary, and carried predictions of experts that for some time yet Europe would depend on America for most of her choice, dry wheat. To this bullish news was added opinions that damage was to be feared from further rains in the Canadian northwest. Another thing that helped send prices upward were the large export clearances of wheat and flour, which equaled 1.197,000 bushels. Good milling demand, especially from the southwest, also served to stiften prices. Primary receipts of wheat today were 1,339.000 bushels.

Corn Held Firm.

Some of the recent bull snap was out of the corn market today, as traders believe that a turn is due. traders believe that a turn is due.
