

SUBMIT TO DECISION

Thirty-Five Western Railroads Will Accept Commission's Finding.

CHICAGO, March 1.—Thirty-five western railroads decided to-day to make no appeal from the recent decision of the interstate commerce commission, denying the roads the right to increase freight rates.

The decision was reached at a meeting to-day of representatives of roads at the Western Trunk Association headquarters here.

It also was argued that if the roads comply with the decree without objection the hope of a large representative gathering, say those interested in the hope of a meeting in the Church House of St. Andrew's Church, corner King and Simcoe-streets.
