Asquith Makes Fighting Speech-Constitution Sacrificed, Says. Baltour

LONDON, April 20.—It is reported that the government has decided to accelerate the passage of the veto bill thru the commons so that it may go up to the house of lords by May 16, if necessary, this result will be attained by a recourse to the guillotine measure

necessary, this result will be attained by a recourse to the guillouine measure.

Premier Asquith, in a fighting speech declared that the government would accept no amendments which would exclude from the clause any class of levislation. The assumption underlying the bill, he said, was that the house of commons, representing the people, had provided checks on the house of lords. They were not taking away its veto, but were only limiting its duration and scope.

"The veto of the crown is gone," exclaimed the prime minister. "It is as dead as Queen Anne. It has gone by disuse; so ought the veto of the house of lords have gone."

"When the house of lords turned itself into a permanent partisan ally of one particular party," continued Mr. Asquith, it became necessary to deal with it by legislation. The Liberal party had received a mandate from the country for the bill, and would use the machinery created by it in this parliament to carry out the objects the party had at heart."

Mr. Balfour, leader of the opposition said that the claim that the house of commons should be ominpatent in legislation "was a monstrous doctrine." It meant an absolute single chamber of government. He maintained that the electors did not know when, they returned the government that they were votting for home rule, the whole constitution being sacrificed in a scandalous bargain between the government and the Nationalists.


