to the call, and it is confidently anticipated that Toronto's objective of \$30,000,000 will be attained long before the end of the drive. There may not be as many small subscriptions, but surface indications are that the man who last year took out bonds more as an obligation is subscribing to the loan on this occasion because of its value as a good sound investment. As an evidence of this fact the experience of a certain team captain may be quoted. In comparing the record of his team this year with the same period last year he discovered that his subscriptions were fewer, 242 as against 514. There was little difference in the total amount of money subscribed, less than \$11,000 approximately speaking.

All classes of the community are buying freely. One department in the Bell Telephone Company, composed entirely of girls, produced 76 subscriptions out of a total of 80. An agent in district "B" sold one man \$2,000 worth of bonds in 100 lots. The buyer giving as his reason for splitting up his purchase that he was going to utilize them for Christmas presents.

The queerest prospect of all was landed by Canvasser Burk of district "A," who persuaded an old fellow to place his life savings of \$1,000, which he had kept hidden in a mattress for many years, in Victory bonds. Soldiers are going into the work of investing with a will. At Davisville Hospital, 370 patients aggregated the nice sum of \$25,000. A movement is on foot amongst them to petition Ottawa to give the gratuity, which has been so warm a question recently, in order that the recipients may invest the gratuities in bonds. The soldiers point out that this would be a double service, to themselves and the government.

**HOSPITAL HAS DEFICIT**  
Institution for Incurables Needs Funds Amounting to \$9,495.  
The Hospital for Incurables held its annual meeting yesterday afternoon, Mr. Ambrose Kent presiding. The report of the superintendent, Miss Cook, stated that the hospital had cared for 314 patients during the year; 85 were admitted and 75 deaths recorded. In the institution 40 patients have to be fed three times daily, over 150 have to be bathed, dressed and lifted into chairs, 70 are altogether incompetent to serve themselves and have to be waited upon hand and foot. The superintendent pointed out that the laundry and engine room should be moved from the hospital building, and that there was need for dormitories for the hospital help.

Miss I. Z. Groat read the financial statement reporting that the deficit of \$35,000 a year ago had been met by a special grant from the city of \$18,000; and increased rate to the government, which realized the need of \$11,000 in August. The disbursements for the year totaled \$119,000 the patients' maintenance fees amounted to \$23,000, and that a deficit was still on hand to be carried over to the next year, of \$9,495. The adoption of the reports was moved by F. D. Hayes and seconded by Sir William Gage. Canon Dyson Hague in an address told the story of the Hospital for Incurables.

**IN POLICE NET.**

She is alleged to have stolen \$24 worth of articles from a downtown store.
