YORK COUNTY AND SUBURBS DEER PARK ANNEXATION

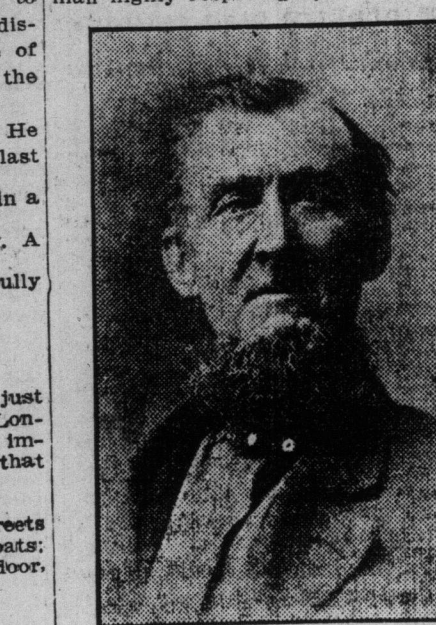
Another Attempt May Be Made to Join With the City—Various Happenings.

Deer Parkers are intended to take another whirl at annexation with the city. The last movement in this direction was called off, it is stated, by one who has now become a resident of Toronto, having sold out his township interest. Ben Sinclair, who has taken a deep interest in the matter, avows his intention of bringing the question to the fore again as soon as he gets thru with laborious duties in connection with the enlargement of the Presbyterian Church. "Look here, boss," said the genial Mr. Sinclair yesterday to The World man, "you can get better \$20 a foot than you can in the Avenue—road district for three times the price." The reason was enquired after by the scribe, and Mr. Sinclair said there was no other than that the property lacked a few blocks farther west.

THE SHERWOOD LUTHERAN CELEBRATED ITS CENTENARY

Pleasant Event in Vaughan Township—Honor is Paid to Sturdy Pioneers.



The historic old Township of Vaughan has been the scene of many notable gatherings, but, possibly, none more interesting than that of yesterday, when the centenary of Sherwood Lutheran Church was held, on the very spot where, 100 years ago, was erected the little log structure which, for many years, served as the religious home of the early Lutherans.

In all respects the gathering was a great success. The weather conditions were ideal; the attendance, drawn from every part of the fine old township and from the city, was remarkably large, while the literary and musical entertainment was of a high order.

The centenary was observed on the spacious lawn of the parsonage, adjoining the church, where a temporary platform was erected, on which were seated representatives of all the churches, among others, Rev. Dr. Car-

roll, Rev. Mr. Wilson, Rev. Mr. Campbell, Rev. Mr. Wilsnager, Rev. Mr. Back (Maple), Rev. Mr. Newton Hill (King City), and Rev. C. L. Wilsnager (King City). The chairman was Rev. Mr. Wilson.

A feature of the afternoon was the address by Rev. Mr. Wilsnager, the present pastor, a graduate of a German university, and for the past year has ministered to the spiritual wants of the Sherwood Lutheran Church.

Sherwood Church was established in 1806, by Jacob Fischer and his wife and John Jacob Kiefer and wife. They came from Somerset County, Pa., through the practically unbroken forest, thru the Buffalo and Niagara Falls, and on thru to what is to-day one of the most fertile sections of Canada.

Rev. Johann Deten, a German, was the first pastor, coming over from Pennsylvania to take charge of the work. Jacob Kiefer, the Fischer and Michael Conrad, Jacob Fischer and John Snider deacons. The first building erected, in 1806, was a little log church, which was followed, many years later, by a small frame one, and in 1860 by the present handsome edifice.

Reviewing the progress of the church, Rev. Mr. Carmichael paid a glowing tribute to the founder of the church.

The most powerful influence of the 16th century was Martin Luther, and when the little German mother named his thesis to the cathedral in Wittenberg, an influence was put in motion which electrified the world.

In eloquent terms, Rev. Mr. Deten, the pioneer, who, coming to an unknown wilderness, laid broad and deep the foundations of British toleration and liberty.

Short addresses were given by Rev. Mr. Wilson and Rev. Mr. Back. Following the afternoon proceedings, luncheon was served by the ladies of the congregation of the church in the large dining tent.

At 8 o'clock a platform meeting was held, presided over by Dr. Gilmour, warden of Central Prison, while a number of addresses were given by Rev. Mr. Hill, Rev. Mr. Carmichael, Rev. Mr. Back, Pastor Wilsnager, Rev. Mr. Wilson and Rev. Mr. Campbell. Miss Mabel Manley, Miss Edith Kiefer and Miss Nellie Campbell contributed largely to the pleasure of the evening.

MISSOURI SHOUTS "BRYAN."

Democrats There Demand His Election to Presidency in 1908.

Jefferson City, Mo., June 6.—The platform adopted at the Democratic state convention last night declares that William J. Bryan was defeated by corrupt campaign contributions by trusts and that he is the great American Democrat and that Missouri demands his election to the presidency in 1908.

It denounces the tariff and censures President Roosevelt for favoring the tariff revision. It also censures the federal constitution providing for the election of United States senators by direct vote, abolition of practice of corporations contributing to campaign funds of political parties and that corporations be kept out of politics.

South Dakota Reforms.

Sioux Falls, S. D., June 6.—The Republican state convention platform demands an anti-pass, the prohibition of the use of telegraph and express franks except by employees, abolition of lobbying before the legislature, a primary election law, an amendment to the federal constitution providing for the election of United States senators by direct vote, abolition of practice of corporations contributing to campaign funds of political parties and that corporations be kept out of politics.

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Harrisburg, Pa., June 6.—The Republican state convention to-day adopted a platform heartily endorsing the administration of President Roosevelt for its vigorous and successful enforcement, thru the department of justice, of the anti-trust and interstate commerce law.

For Public Ownership.

Yankton, S. D., June 6.—The Democratic state convention to-day adopted a platform declaring for government ownership of railroad, telegraph and telephones.
