A Coffee Ring Started.

New York, Sept. 27.—Announcement was made today by the Commercial Union Bank that the financing of Brazil's coffee valuation plan had been arranged. Bankers and merchants, however, are not convinced that the plan will succeed.

The object of the coffee valuation plan is to maintain coffee at a remunerative price to the grower by establishing a minimum quotation, at which it is to be held by purchases of coffee on account of the three coffee states of Brazil, namely, the states of Sao Paulo, Rio and Minas. Interest on the loan made is guaranteed and paid by a tax on every bag of coffee shipped.

The contracting states bind themselves to resist or discourage, by discriminatory taxation, the exportation of coffee of inferior grades, and to further themselves to pass laws preventing the extension of coffee acreage for two years after Jan. 1, 1907.
