Pat Powers Talks of Election—His Own Board of Directors.

Pat Powers, elected head of the Eastern League, is also secretary and treasurer as well as president.

The new board of directors was chosen by Powers. That was one of the provisions of his accepting the presidency and two of the clubs represented on the board voted against him for president.

"That, however, did not matter," said President Powers. "I wanted men who represented the biggest property interests in the league."

I also want to say that I did not seek the office and now that the election is over, that everything is harmonious.

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A man of the name of Powers, but he played his trump card and won the pot, the presidency of the Eastern League.

The little game was played at the annual meeting of the Eastern League at the Victoria Hotel and, after consulting President Harry L. Taylor of Buffalo was defeated for re-election by the score of 5 to 3.

But the real reason was a re-nomination a year ago, owing to a pressure of business, would have it, he submitted himself to the election in connection with the presidency this year just because he hates to disappoint friends.

Mr. P. T. had been carefully laying his plans for 12 months aiming to retrieve the Eastern League, and so the league—the majority of the magnates—elected the Jersey City man in preference to a man of his own club.

Buffalo, Newark and Baltimore voted for Taylor; Providence, Jersey City, Toronto, Hamilton, and Montreal for Powers.

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Chapin declared he supported Powers because he believed him to be a better man for the position at the present time, with three clubs without managers. It is believed, however, that the real reason was because of Taylor's decision in awarding a protested game to Montreal, which prevented the Buffalo team from finishing in third place.

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There are three new managers to be elected to the Eastern League for next season. Buffalo and Jersey City are the only clubs who have not yet elected a manager. Jersey City has elected J. Murray, but he has been drafted by Washington. Toronto has elected by the Toronto Baseball Club, but he has been drafted by Boston.
