ON TRIAL FOR HIS LIFE.

Warren Wright Before the Court—His Little Daughter, Who Saw the Killing, Will Testify Against Him.

Buffalo, Nov. 22.—In the presence of the daughter, Mary, and his little son, children of the woman he murdered on the night of Aug. 6 at Springfield, Warren Wright was placed on trial for his life before Justice Woodward and a jury of his peers in criminal term of the Supreme Court today. Mary, the pretty girl who looks like her dead mother, and who saw the killing on the night of Aug. 6 last, was brought into court, leading her little brother by the hand. She walked with her head up and looked at her father calmly, but with no sign of emotion. She will testify against him to the electric chair if it lies in her power. She has no love for him. It all died at the moment she saw him strike her mother and follow the blow with murder.

Wright's crime will be admitted by his counsel, and the defence will consist entirely of an attempt to prove insanity. It will be the greatest battle of experts ever held in a Buffalo court. Half of the experts will swear positively that Wright is insane and the other half will swear positively that he is perfectly sane. The jury has the puzzling task before it. The jury will be summoned from a special panel of 70 men.

WHAT AN ABSURDITY!

Proposed Arbitration Treaty Which Shuts Out All Questions Likely to be Subjects of Arbitration.

New York, Nov. 22.—To the new arbitration treaty between the United States and Great Britain, which is being drafted by the State Department, there has been added, a correspondent of The World in Washington says, a clause which did not appear in the recent publication of the gist of the document.

This clause provides that "national honor, domestic integrity and vital political interests are not subjects of arbitration." By "national integrity" it means questions affecting the territorial rights of either party. Consequently the one question likely to give friction between the Governments at Washington and London—the delimitation of the Alaskan boundary—cannot be submitted under the treaty. The phrase "vital political interests" is made a subject of arbitration.

The few friends of real arbitration, who have been informed in confidence of the terms of the proposed treaty, say but little that would be binding in it. The arbitrators will be two from each Government and they will agree upon a third, who is not to be a reigning sovereign of Europe or selected by such a sovereign. Before a question can be submitted to arbitration the Senate will have to pass upon it. If the Senate votes in the affirmative, the court of arbitration will be created, but if the Senate should be antagonistic to the proposition even to refer the matter to arbitration would fail.

The present convention is said by many to be an effort to please the advocates of arbitration, while giving to the State the control for which it fought at the last session.
