PLAIN WORDS TO ORANGEMEN

Mr. Morgan Wood Points Them to the Catholics for a Lesson. The preacher talks of "Patriotic Hotness" - Annual Church Parade of the County Lodge of Orange County Lodge of Toronto to take place in the annual church parade and anniversary service.

The delightfully cool weather of Sunday afternoon induced 2500 members of the Orange County Lodge of Toronto to take part in the annual church parade and anniversary service.

Large delegations from all the lodges, including the Western District, assembled in Queen's-avenue and a few minutes after 1 o'clock the procession, headed by W. Bro. Charles H. Noble, County D. of C., and the colored side and drum band, proceeded by way of College-street to Yonge-street and Wilton-avenue to Bond-street Congregational Church. There was no definite arrangement regarding the order of marching as the members "fell in" wherever they were somewhat mixed. The junior association came first, with the Orange Knights, the Society, Knights and Royal Black Knights following. There were also five of the local life and drum bands.

At the Church. After the Orangemen had been admitted to the church the public were allowed to enter and when the service commenced the spacious church was crowded. The service opened with the hearty singing of "All Hail to the Power of Jesus' Name." Pastor Morgan Wood invoked blessings on the order collectively and individually. Rev. H. C. Dixon, County Chaplain, read Psalms 119 and 20, the congregation reciting alternate verses. After the inspiring hymn, "Onward Christian Soldiers," and a short scripture reading, the pastor asked for a liberal collection on behalf of the order in aid of the Orphan Asylum, Home and True Blue Orphanage Fund, which he hoped would be responded to by all present without much solicitation, as is "required from my own congregation."

While the collection was in progress several members of the choir rendered delightful solos under the direction of the organist and choirmaster, A. B. Jurey.

He 14 to Orangemen. In commenting the sermon, Rev. Morgan Wood stated that he was much surprised at being asked to preach to the Orange Order, as he was not a member himself "on the inside, but I am on the outside." He mentioned it, not only a pleasure, but an honor. He then took his text from St. Matthew viii. 23. "For one who your Master, even Christ; and will not take an example the Roman Catholic who goes to mass at 6 o'clock every Sunday morning, when my son can't get here at 11."

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Speaking of Orangemen, he said that the only impediment to the progress of the order was the ambition of some of its junior associations to fight or put down the Catholics. "That is why I call patriotic rottenness," said he. "For no better lesson can be taught the members of the Orange Order than to take as an example the Roman Catholic who goes to mass at 6 o'clock every Sunday morning, when my son can't get here at 11."

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THE COUNCIL OF PHYSICIANS

Talked About Their Finances at Their Saturday Session.

The Council of the College of Physicians and Surgeons met again Saturday morning and continued all day in session, with a short meeting at night.

The opening exercise in the morning was the forming of the Executive Committee, composed of Drs. Luton, Moore and Stewart. An objection was taken against President Luton being included, but the motion of Dr. Rogers carried.

Dr. Hanley called the proceedings of the Discipline Committee to be covered, and announced that the motion was carried by a majority of one. The motion was intended more as a warning to medical men to beware of lapsing into unprofessional conduct.

Dr. Sangster's Motion Dr. Sangster called the attention of the Council to the fact that the motion of Dr. Luton, Moore and Stewart, which was passed at the last meeting, was not carried out.

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
