CUBANS ARE UGLY.

reating Spaniards in Havana

With Contempt and Taunting

Them With Defeat.

Havana, Sept. 22.—Disturbances in public places between Cubans and Spaniards are becoming frequent. The Cubans are assuming an insolent and abusive manner in their treatment of the Spaniards, whom they lose no opportunity of openly referring to as vanquished. Many of them wear miniature Cuban flags, the lone star of which acts upon the Spanish officers as does a red ray upon a bull.

In consequence of the serious disorders which have occurred Military Governor Arolus has issued a general order making it obligatory upon every officer to wear his undform and carry arms in public whether on duty or not, in order to avoid mistakes as to identity.

Yesterday afternoon two boats rowed across the bay towards the transport Resolute. One was occupied by Cubans from Regla, among them being the well-known insurgent chief Rodriguez. The other was filled with Spanish pleasure seekers. The boat in which the Cubans were drew alongside the other and its occupants began taunting and jeering at the Spaniards, who answered back. When the boats were close to the Resolute, Rodriguez took up an oar and struck one of the Spaniards over the head with it, inflicting painful wounds. One of the latter's companions jumped into the boat, sprang upon Rodriguez and bit his whole nose off. The fight become general and several of the participants were slightly wounded. No arrests were made. The disturbances are looked upon as having political color, as they always occur he were supplied and Cubans. Colonial Cabinet to be Consulted. Havana, Sept. 22.—Yesterday evening the Colonial Cabinet held a session, presided over by Captain-General Blanco, to treat of matters pertaining to the evacuation of the Island, and to examine into and approve of the decisions of the Supreme Government, in answer to questions which wifi arise at the Paris Peace Conference. The Colonial Government's judgment and opinion will extend to matters of grave import, such as the administration of justice, civilights, citizenship rights, international relations, territorial rights, the public dest and internal debt of the colony, university and professional titles, industrial and intellictual rights, liberty of the army, commerce and tariff regulations and other subjects equally vital. The Colonial Cabinet has been furnished with a list of the questions which will arise and the answers to be given, as decided upon at Madrid, and its advice was solicited on those different points, and it is understood the answers are fully approved by it.

The important document will be taken to Paris by Dr. Congosto, Secretary-General of Cuba, who will sall for Europe, via New York, on Saturday next.

## DEATH IN THE FLOATING MARSHES-

Seattle, Wash., Sept. 22.—A rush to the Klondike, a part of which went overland through Canadian territory, has given the terrible floating marshes between the Nelson and Peace Rivers more victims. Among them was Frederick Short of Chicago, Early last spring a party of seven men, all Easterners, started from Fort St. John on the Peace River, to cross the marshes to the Nelson River. They did not return to Fort St. John, and later it was found that they had not reached either Fort Nelson or Fort Halkett. All must have gone down in the marshes with their horses and outlits. Frederick Short is the only man in the party whose name was known.

Joseph Hotu of Montreal, the first of six hundred pilgrims who tried the route and got through, brought the news to Dawson. He was a year on the road and traveled 4500 miles. He got through safely by floating 800 miles in an easterly direction on the Peace River to Lake Athabasca and on portions of the Mackenzie and McMillan Rivers.
