Vancouver, B.C., April 25.-(Special.)-According to despatches from Korea, reeived by the mail steemship Empress of the favorite mistress of the Emperor, who has dreams of ascending the throne through the help of Russia. The Emperor has leased exclusively to Russia three whaling ports—Ouslan, sungchinoo and Chinpodo—in all 700 meters in length and 350 in breadth. His ministers say beware of Russia, and the Emperor echoed Russia must not have a foot of Korean territory. Lady Om was appealed to by the Russians.
