Winnipeg, April 25.—(Special)—The
Edmonton Bulletin, published by Frank
Oliver, Liberal M.P., says:
"A. E. Lee, formerly of Edmonton, writes
from Dawson City under date of March 7,
stating in regard to the commission for
investigation."

"I had the pleasure of waiting upon
the court on opening day in answer to
a subpoena, which turned out, how-
ever, to have been served on the wrong
man; consequently as I had walked
sixty miles to attend court, it was of
interest to know who would compensate
me for loss of time and out-of-pocket
expenses incident to my journey to the
town. Mr. Ogilvie said he had no

penses, even. Now, what is the use
of 'posters' setting forth Mr. Ogilvie's

they were forced to pay some one at
the postoffice 22 hours, and to obtain a
letter, or \$5 or \$10 to the door-
keeper of the gold Commissioner's office
in order to get an admission to that
'holy of holies.'"

Berlin, April 25.—The German press con-
tinues to maintain a moderate tone regard-
