SEPARATED PEOPLES BEING REUNITED

Aryan Tongue Gathering Together Its Users in Great "Melting Pot."

All the people who speak English, German, Russian, French, Spanish, Italian, Welsh, Erse or Irish, Scotch or Gaelic, and some of the Asiatic languages, trace their origin back to the old Aryan race.

It used to be thought that the Aryans came from some point in Asia several thousands of years ago. But now certain people claim that their home was in the southern steppes of Russia; and that the Indian and Persian branch went towards the east, the Slavs and Teutons into the German forests, and the Greeks towards Greece; while the forefathers of the Celts and Romans followed the Danube River into Italy and Gaul.

We know that all these peoples are related from many words that have the same root. We can tell by words even now in use, when the peoples dwell together, when they separated, one group from another, and something about their daily habits and lives. For instance, we know that the Aryans traveled in carts drawn by cattle, because our words "wheel," "axle," "yoke," and "wagon" all come from Aryan root-words. We know that at one time they were pastoral people, depending mainly on their flocks and herds, because our words "ewe," "wether," "wool," "cow," "ox," "steer," and "herd" come from Aryan words.

Other words tell us that they were a nomadic people, migrating according to the season to obtain pasturage. It is a curious thought, that seems to have occurred to no one, that many of the Aryan peoples are coming together again in the United States, for the first time since their separation thousands of years back. It will take centuries for their amalgamation in what has been called the "Melting Pot," but doubtless the people thus descended will be the greatest people in the world.

COUNTY LICENSES ARE DISTRIBUTED

The forty-nine standard hotel licenses issued to owners of hotels in the city and county became effective May 1. At least three more will be issued within the next few days, providing inspectors are satisfied that the men who are to be licensed are qualified to handle the business.

The necessary instructions with respect to the new prohibited list have been received by Inspector Kenney, and the first name will go down on the roll of a list of names who are to be prohibited from getting liquor by express. Applications can be made to the inspector, and if the circumstances justify the complaint made the name of the person complained of will be entered on the list of those "who shall taste not, or handle not."

The magistrate is empowered, under the act, to place the names of persons on the list of names who are prohibited from getting liquor by express, and to appear in police court charged with intoxication. Upon the third offence the magistrate will instruct that the name be entered.

BY GOING SLOWLY STATES HOPES TO AVOID MISTAKES

President Braithwaite Tells of Impressions of Visit.

MET MANY CANADIANS

New Professors for Western University Will Be Secured Very Shortly.

President Braithwaite of the Western University has just returned from visiting several of the eastern American cities, and has written his impression of the war and other activities there.

The privilege, which the president of a Canadian university has just had of spending a week among some of the greatest of the American universities, was naturally an important one.

I had one special mission, absorbing practically my whole time, about which something more will be said, but in spite of this, preventing certain other investigations which would have been gladly followed up, there were, of course, many interesting incidents, some of them having nothing to do with university life at all.

It was an eventful time to visit the United States, as the nation is feeling its way towards the best manner of following up its recent declaration of war. It may seem that the country is not as quick in really getting into the war as might be expected of Americans, especially in view of the remarkable rapid action of Britain at the outbreak of hostilities. The speed of the speediest arming of troops is not, however, as rapid as that now as it was in those exciting summer days of 1914.

Prevent Mistakes.
By greater deliberation the United States may also be preserved from many of the mistakes made by the Allies, just as the seemingly tardy action of President Wilson in allowing his country to be actively identified with the war is having the advantage at least, that he is carrying with him a far greater unanimity of opinion than the American people than he could have done a year or two ago.

I was at Baltimore, within an hour's ride of Washington, the day before the British representatives arrived there. It was a little later by those from France. But as I was greatly pressed for time, and thought that they would excuse me, I did not tarry to greet them.

I was, however, while in the cities of the Atlantic seaboard, quite struck by the atmosphere of the international good-will being manifested, which is highly significant of the rapidly different way in which the world is going to do things after this frightful war is over. Every great war has its own revolution in this respect among the nations of the world than any previous war.

A Rich Choice.
I was fortunate in being able to spend my Sunday in New York city, where the princes of the American pulp are always to be found. I have a rich choice before me, but I did not hesitate long. It seemed to me that the two greatest preachers I could hear that day were J. W. C. A. and Hugh Black, and that it was no little satisfaction to remember that they were both Britishers. My nephew arranged for me to be admitted as a pew holder in the door in advance, and we were welcomed into a special pew with Treasurer Rogers and his two lovely daughters. Hundreds of others who were anxious to hear Dr. J. W. C. A. were compelled to turn away disappointed. Dr. J. W. C. A. told me after the service that while he was going back to England, he had agreed not to leave his present post till next spring.

Billy Sunday was also in the midst of his New York campaign at that time, and on that Sunday is reported to have grasped the hand of 3,000 "rail-birds." Billy does not seem to figure as prominently on the first page of the New York dailies as he does in the papers of other American cities, but war news is now getting a larger place than before, and Billy has had months more in which to wage his battle against the demons of New York.

Met Many Canadians.
It was a pleasure to meet many Canadians who were figuring so prominently in the work of the university life, like President Schurman of Cornell, my old classmate, and the Canadian students, like my former classmate J. A. Soland, one of the vigorous leaders of the active Canadian League in Connecticut, and my nephew, C. W. Eckardt, one of the big real estate men in New York city, who appraises more property than any other man in the city, which probably makes him the richest man in the Western Hemisphere.

My principal object was to look up some of the staff of the Western. The board of governors of the university are fully persuaded that the West is not to be established on the strongest basis, so that it will not take a second place as far as the work which it undertakes is concerned. While this involves advancement along several different lines, there is no other one matter that counts as much as to make strength, the men who are to make up its faculty.

Were Not Suitable.
I had received long lists of men who had been recommended in the highest terms for the positions we wished to fill. They were partly sifted out before leaving, and on closer consideration, the majority of them did not meet our requirements. There are a few, however, with whom negotiations will be concluded during the next few weeks, and concerning whom announcements will be made from time to time. There is every reason to believe that the men we shall add to our faculty will be among the best of their kind in the world.

Chairman Thomas Rowe and Secretary R. M. McEldheran will name the committees and make the arrangements for the picnic. The committee in charge of the picnic will discuss the suggestion later.

HURON CONVENTION CONDEMNS M.P.'S STAND

Scores E. N. Lewis Over Rum Ration Issue—Reports Enforcement of Temperance Act.

CLINTON, May 1.—The Huron County branch of the Dominion Alliance reviewed another year of determined hostility to the liquor traffic and outlined a program of activity for the coming year in the annual convention of the county organization.

The active co-operation of the county organization, and the law has been well enforced. Huron is one of the three counties of the province which is making good under the Canada Temperance Act with the assistance of important clauses of the Ontario Temperance Act and the hearty support of the provincial board of commissioners.

A resolution was passed recommending that each church observe a week of prayer, commencing May 15, in connection with the war and liquor traffic. A resolution to the effect that the prohibition as a war measure and another to Lloyd George, premier of Britain, urging root and branch methods to deal with the nation's greatest enemy, were passed.

CAN REDUCE FIRE LOSS IF CITIZENS ARE CAREFUL

Chief Aitken Says Seventy-Five Per Cent Can Be Saved.

"If citizens could be made to understand that over 75 per cent of the fires in this city are preventable, the percentage could be reduced to a minimum," said Fire Chief Aitken today, in speaking of the annual number of fires that occur always at housecleaning time. A large proportion

of the twenty-two fires during the month of April originated in piles of waste paper and rubbish carelessly left in cellars, closets and out of way corners. The fire which started among some papers in the London Loan Company building on Thursday last happened in the night when the building would have been gutted, according to the fire chief. Waste paper fires have usually occurred before they have developed to any great proportions. Defective chimneys and defective wiring usually have caused many fires that could be prevented if citizens would inspect their
