BORDEN HEADS REBORN PARTY OF UNIONISTS

Premier Again Offers To Resign—For Effect.

ORPHANS CRY "NO! NO!"

Without Union Some Ministers Would Have Nowhere To Go, So Union It Is.

OTTAWA, June 26.—Unionists this morning at a half-hearted caucus from which a number of the independents stayed away, decided to endeavor to salvage the remnants of union, and to make a party out of them. Premier Borden once again expressed his willingness to retire, but the members of the caucus after glancing round the assembly, declared that he had better stay with the ship, unseaworthy though it might appear to be. So the premier did not press the point.

There were absent from the caucus Hon. T. A. Cresser, Hon. W. S. Fielding, Hon. F. B. Carvell, Dr. Clark, Hon. Red Deer and F. P. Pender of West Lumberton, and a number of others, including several of the old line Conservatives.

Would Perpetuate Union.
The prime minister having reviewed the situation and having impressed on the gathering the fact that "Union" was needed now just as much as in time of war, admitted that the war was a knotty problem, but not an insurmountable one if the manufacturers would adopt a sane and take policy and the grain growers an attitude of compromise.

Then there arose Hon. C. C. Ballantyne, Hon. Newton Wesley Rowell and Hon. J. A. Chalmers, who each chanted the praises of union, and swore allegiance to the leader.

The Rev. Mr. Stacey of the Westminster

district, thereupon proposed a resolution calling for the formation of a Union party with a platform and a policy, and for a vote of confidence in the present leader. He did not get any seconded and from the rank and file there were few words uttered in favor of the proposal. A recently appointed senator from New Brunswick, it is rumored, rose and scoffed at the idea, but for the most part there was an attitude of absolute indifference.

Many Keep Their Seats.
The chairman of the resolution and called for a vote standing up. Some stood up in sincere approval of the proposal, others, because they are political orphans, and have nowhere to go because they were indifferent and refused that the resolution meant nothing; some stood up because they didn't want to be conspicuous by remaining seated. A number, however, including Maharg of Maple Creek, Thomson of Qu'Appelle, McNutt of Saulteaux, Senator Turritt and others remained in their seats, when the vote was taken. W. Buchanan of Lethbridge went out before the vote was taken.

Amid applause the motion was carried and the party declared born. The cabinet is now to prepare a platform which will satisfy all the diverse elements of the new party. This platform, which will be hammered together before the election, will be submitted to another caucus, at which, it is stated, a goodly number of those present this morning, will not be present.

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SENATE VOTE MAY NOT KILL PROHIBITION

Premier Thinks Order May Be Valid For a Year.

A DIVISION IN COMMONS

House Passes Motion Disagreeing With Action of Upper Chamber.

OTTAWA, June 26.—The House of Commons went on record today by a vote of 105 to 24, disagreeing with the Senate's action in amending the prohibition bill.

Discusses Prohibition.
The orders-in-council, which were passed under the war measures act, stipulated that they should remain in force for twelve months after the conclusion of the war. The House of Commons, however, it was announced, was to make federal prohibition terminate on the expiration of the war. This morning the Senate amended the orders-in-council, and Sir Robert Borden moved that the House disagree with the amendment. "If the House," he said, "should assent to the amendment it would simply be passing the principle for which the bill was passed."

Reasons Given.
Sir Robert's motion reads: "This House disagrees with the Senate amendment for the following reasons: 1.—The Senate amendment destroys the principle and purpose of the bill, the continuance of the war in any event and without any confining act; and possibly they may be valid for the period of twelve months thereafter mentioned in the orders-in-council. Therefore, the bill as amended by the Senate does not give the orders-in-council any greater validity than they now possess, while on the other hand it expressly limits their possible operation."

"2.—In view of the difficulties which confront the country during the period of readjustment and having regard to dangers and unemployment and to the conditions of unrest which prevail throughout the Dominion the reasons which justified the passing of the orders-in-council continue to exist during the period covered by the bill as passed by the House."

Means Conservation.
"3.—The interests of the maintenance of peace, order and good government in Canada, and it will tend to prevent waste, promote thrift, conserve resources and national efficiency."

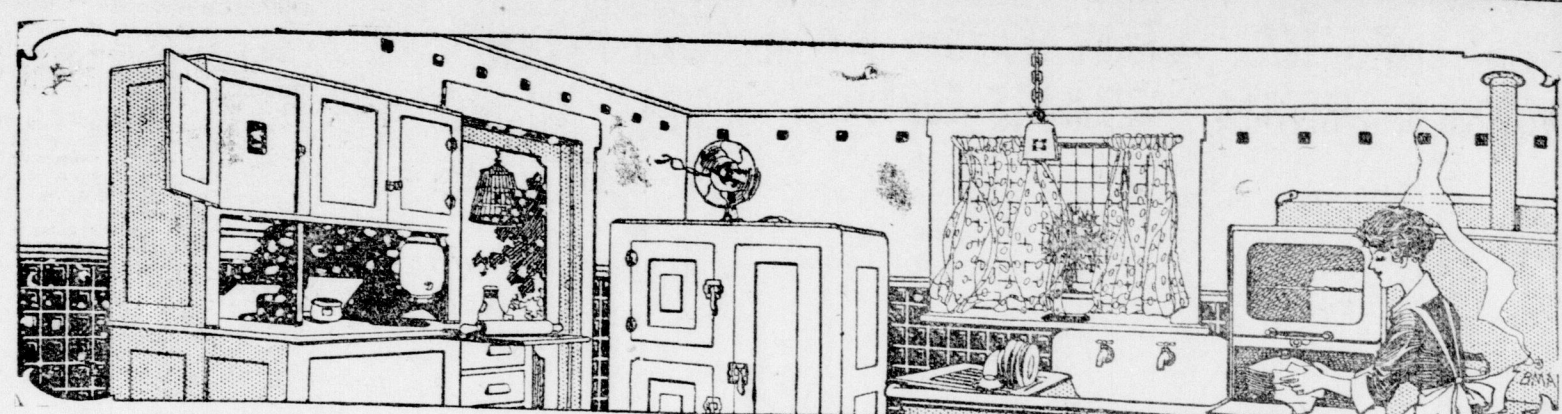
Replies to a question by Mr. Bureau, Hon. Mr. McPherson stated that the Government had secured a legal opinion for the department of justice as to justify the passing of the bill.

Mr. Lapointe, Kamouraska, said he had heard so many members of the House privately approve of the action of the Senate that he desired to place himself on record as being opposed to the motion made by the prime minister.

When the motion was put, a number of members on the Opposition benches demanded a formal division. This resulted in Sir Robert Borden's 71, the vote standing 105 for and 24 against. All the members of the Government, Messrs. Baldwin, Sinclair (Antigonish), Robb, Duff, Copp, White (Victoria), MacIsaac (Quebec), McManis, Pedlow and Hunt also voted for it.

The French members were practically sold against the motion.

BRANTFORD TO MARK PEACE RELIGIOUSLY
BRANTFORD, June 26.—Brantford will hold a peace celebration of a purely religious character on Sunday, July 5, under civic auspices, provided that there will be no general celebration until the British Government has set the lead. This was approved by the city council at a special session this evening.



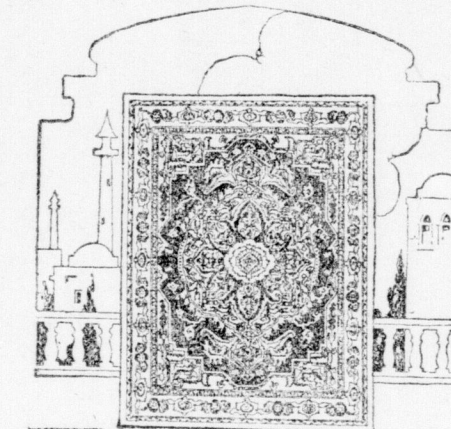

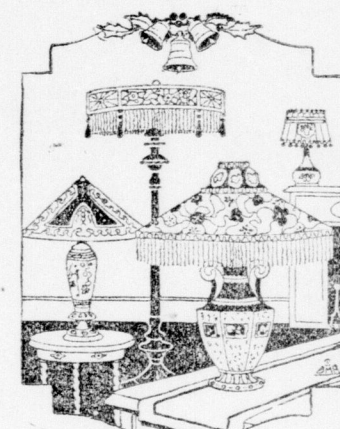

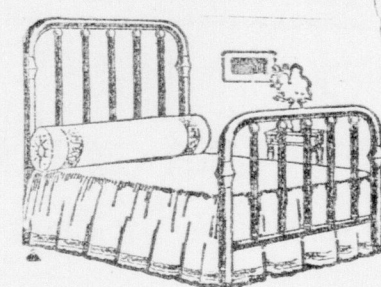

Carrying on of public works authorized by Parliament. Meeting expenditures for general purposes authorized by Parliament.
