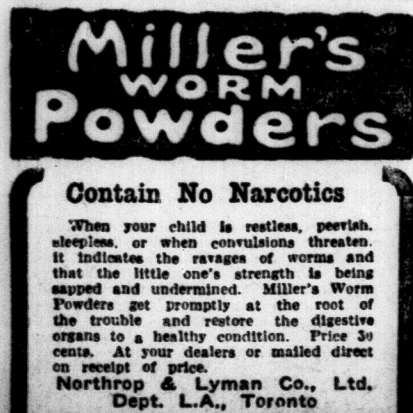

LIQUOR IMPORTATION
HAD LITTLE EFFECT
ON DISPENSARY SALEOntario Government Sold Over
Two Millions in Seven
Months.

TORONTO, April 6.—The moonshiner doesn't need to get caught to increase Ontario revenue, according to the report of the Ontario License Commission, tabled in the Legislature today. The booze he makes and gets seized is taken by the board and redistilled and sold for industrial purposes. Last year the revenue from this source to the province was \$37,000.

Real booze, too, when it is seized, has a double revenue to the province. First there is the fine, and then the board takes the liquor and sells it in the dispensaries. The large sum of \$72,724.48 was derived in sales of liquor which had been seized last year.

Twenty permits for the manufacture of native wines were issued in 1919, and 530 permits for industrial concerns to use alcohol for manufacturing purposes.

Liquor Was Donated.
Considerable liquor was donated to provincial and other hospitals for medicinal purposes. Large quantities of inferior liquor were redistilled "with excellent results." It was turned into 65 over-proof alcohol. The report adds significantly "further like revenue will doubtless be obtained from time to time."

Revocation of the Dominion order-in-council prohibiting liquor importations has affected the volume but little, for the reason that the dispensaries have the confidence of the public as to quality, price and service, as compared with the traffickers beyond the province whose aim is the largest and speediest profits obtainable," says the report.

Dispersaries' Profits.
The net profits of the dispensaries for the seven months are reported as \$376,094, or 20.20 per cent of the sales. Regarding the policy pursued the report says: "The board aims at a basis of gross profit of 33 1/3 per cent on the sale price with discounts to druggists, doctors and manufacturers; to hospitals the board sells at 5 per cent gross profit, which means less than cost when overhead charges are included."

CONVICTIONS DECREASED.
TORONTO, April 6.—Although convictions under the Ontario temperance act decreased from 3,285 to 2,447 during the year 1919, revenue from fines collected in the same period advanced from \$204,514.38 to \$231,833.80 in the same period, according to the annual report of the Ontario license commission, which was tabled in the Legislature this afternoon.

A net profit of \$376,094 for the first seven months that the liquor dispensaries of the province were under Government control is shown in the report.

"Had the usual policy been employed," the report points out, "the net profits could have been shown to exceed \$400,000, but all initial expenses, such as are generally spread over a term of several years, were wiped off at once."

Sales of Two Million.
Total sales for the seven months' period were \$2,010,404.23, and gross profits \$713,168.65. Gross profits were 35.47 per cent of the sales, and net profits 20.20 per cent.

There were 43 convictions against holders of standard hotel licenses for breaches of the Ontario temperance act during the year, and 2,804 convictions against other persons. There were 479 dismissals. The figures for 1919 were: Against licensees, 43 convictions; other convictions, 2,238; dismissals, 668.

For the year ending April 30, 1919, there were 29 convictions for violations of the Canada Temperance act, which is in force in Huron, Manitoulin and Perth Counties. There were also three dismissals. The previous year convictions totalled 93, and dismissals 15.

Total Fines Collected.
The total amount collected in fines under the act, and payable to the province for the year is \$213,833.80, as against \$204,514.38 the previous year. Fines collected in Toronto totalled \$19,845.40, in York County, \$19,845.40, and in the city, \$2,136.

Expenses of enforcing the act totalled \$126,580.99, as against \$118,982.47 for 1918. Total revenue from the license branch for the year was \$318,087.36, as against \$213,709.44 in 1918.

There were 1,279 standard hotels licensed in the province for the license year ending April 30, 1919.

REPORT OF AUDITOR
OF HYDRO ELECTRIC
TABLED AT TORONTO

Assets of Ontario Commission
Shown As \$51,000,000.

TORONTO, April 6.—Every phase of the Ontario Hydro-Electric Power Commission's business for the year ending October 31, is dealt with in the report of the auditor, G. T. Clarkson of this city, tabled in the Legislature this afternoon.

The statement shows the assets of the commission from October 31 last were \$51,081,982, of which \$19,531,061 is represented by the nine distribution and development systems of the commission, headed by the Niagara system, with an investment of \$14,306,372. The Chippawa developments works to date represents an investment of \$11,713,970; the Ontario Power Company, \$11,254,100. The commission has on deposit with the provincial treasurer a sinking fund payment of \$38,834.

Include Advances.
On the other side of the ledger, liabilities include advances by the province for the Niagara and other systems of \$23,317,816; cash advances to the Niagara power development works (Chippawa) of \$11,075,000. To cover the purchase of the capital stock of the Ontario Power Company, the commission assumed a debenture liability of \$7,904,900.

The auditor states that apparently the members of the commission were not fully advised of the extent by which appropriations were being exceeded, and that the matter having been brought to their attention, steps have been taken to keep expenditures within appropriations. He advises, however, that a general allowance should be voted by the Legislature to meet contingencies for work not anticipated, for such expenditures to be subject to the approval of the Government.

Power Company Report.
The report of Mr. Clarkson on the accounts of the Ontario Power Company and its subsidiary, the Ontario Transmission Company, Limited, was also tabled today.

The assets of the company are shown as \$25,113,388.33, of which \$61,776.07 was added during the last year in the purchase of additional equipment.

JAPAN TO WITHDRAW
IF REDS QUIET DOWN
HONOLULU, April 6.—(Associated Press.)—Cable advice received here today from Tokyo by the Nippon Jiji, state that Minister of War Tanaka has dispatched a note to the Soviet Revolutionary Government at Vladivostok saying that Japan will immediately withdraw her troops from Siberia if the Russian revolutionists will settle the unrest in Vladivostok.
