BUFFALO, July 3.—(Special.)—Buffalo has seen much poor umpiring by Eastern League officials this season, but the king of ineptitude appeared today in the case named Murray. He said he was troubled with rheumatism and should be in the hospital right now. The latter part of his statement is true. He should be somewhere else than on a baseball diamond. The fans hissed him repeatedly and wasted the best part of a basket of lemons with poor shots. He had all the ambition taken out of the Leafs before the game was over and chased Manager Kelley and another player from the grounds for taking exceptions to his decisions. Little wonder that men lose their heads with such beastly work as was seen today.
