DEATH SENTENCE ON ONE GOVIN JURY DISAGREES

Italian to Be Hanged at North Bay Nov. 26—No Verdict in Second Murder Trial

NORTH BAY, Oct. 13.—(Special.)—Sam Spannelli, Italian, found guilty yesterday of fatally stabbing a Chinaman at Halesbury, was to-day sentenced by Justice Riddell to be hanged at North Bay on Nov. 26.

The jury in the case of Saul Gouin, charged with the murder of Carrie Russell near Cobalt, disagreed after two hours. Ten were for acquittal, one for manslaughter and one for murder.

Ethel Crawford, who had been living with the Russell woman in a shack in the woods, swore that Gouin had demanded \$100 that was in the house and attacked them both with a hatchet. Russell died some months later in a Toronto hospital.

Evidence was introduced by the defence showing Gouin to have been an industrious man, of good character, and an effort was made to show that the girl's death might have resulted from other causes than the assault.

WANTS \$12,000 FOR HIS WIFE Loses Her Affections and Sues a Fellow-townsman.

ORANGEVILLE, Oct. 13.—(Special.)—In the case of Walker v. C. P. R., the jury awarded Walker \$1500, claiming that the C. P. R. was negligent in that the train was moving before all the passengers were off.

The case of Robert Kannawin, plaintiff, against W. J. Corbett, defendant, alleged alienation of wife's affections, was begun. Kannawin is asking \$12,000 damages. J. L. Island, K.C., and Robert McKay, K.C., are acting for plaintiff and C. R. MacKeown, K.C., and Hartley Dewart, K.C., for Corbett.

Kannawin, cross-examined by Dewart, swore he had been a carpenter, earning good wages, but is now butchering for less wage. He had never rebuked his wife for going with any one but Corbett. He had been away all of 1907, but learned while away that Corbett was trying to win her affections, and came home and found Corbett with her. She had been away in the fall of 1908 for days. On two occasions he had found letters under the carpet in her room. He read them and returned them. More came. Finally he collected them all and kept them. He had tried to reason with his wife, had gone to Welland with her to get a job, to be away from Orangeville, but his wife did not want to go away. Once he saw Corbett drive up to the back door and take Mrs. Kan-

nawin for a drive. He, with Mr. Holden, had found Corbett and Mrs. Kannawin in the grand stand at Idlewild Park one night last February. "Wit-ness had struck at Corbett and jumped on him, and had his wrist bitten. Mrs. Kannawin told him not to hurt "poor Billy." Witness afterwards ordered his wife from the house, but she replied that Corbett was not ready to take her, and that she would go when ready.

Witness saw his wife in Toronto last September, and went to an amusement resort with her. She wanted him to settle the suit, saying she thought Corbett would pay \$2000.
