Disappearance of Touts

Dealing with touts, rail-road and other unprincipled purveyors of supposedly secret or stolen information, the commission says that the disappearance of these men from the race tracks has only brought a marked improvement in the whole tone and atmosphere of racing

Total Days of Racing

The report says that under the existing conditions it is possible to hold in central Canada 238 days of racing, of which 98 are on the seven Montreal tracks, 45 on the three Windsor tracks, and 95 on the three Toronto tracks

Under the heading of "Traffic in Horses"

Platform Adopted by F.P.O.

After recalling the treatment of the farmers by the Ontario government leading up to the breach of faith and the Ottawa deputation, Mr. Dewart asked: "Where did the Liberals stand in Ontario? Always for agricultural rights so far as consistent with the fair demands of the general public"

U.F.O. and the Recall

He wondered why the government had failed to respect the plans in the U.F.O. policy in favor of the initiative, referendum and recall. He wondered whether the ministers sitting at the table had signed the recall and if so where their recall is (Laughter). Had Mr. Dewart asked for a vote on the recall, he would have been made in East Wellington? It seemed as if the world should come to the aid of the recall

Conservative Chiering

He gave the motto for the Ontario campaign, continued Mr. Dewart. Yet the member for North Victoria, who was within my voice, thinks the discordant note in his Utopian policy of co-operation will come from South-west Toronto. Even ministers of the gospel should not have short memories (Laughter)

Letter Not Answered
