Togo telling his story OF PORT ARTHUR ASSAULTS Russians Lost Heavily in the Heroic Capture of 203 Metre Hill From Russians.

The flotillas arrived outside the entrance to Port Arthur about midnight on that date. The leading flotilla under Commander Uchida and the attack torpedo boat, partly for attack and partly to reconnoitre, approached the Sevastopol at 1 o'clock and under the searchlights and fire of the enemy's ships and shore batteries they attacked.

Commander Otaki's flotilla approached the closest and delivered a most vigorous attack. While retreating one torpedo boat received several shots simultaneously, her commander, Lieutenant Nakahara, was killed and the boat lost her freedom of motion.

It is a source of satisfaction that our torpedo attacks were delivered with such accuracy and assistance to its comrades. The skillful manoeuvring of the boats and the men inspired me with a deep feeling of satisfaction and confidence.

Cambridge, Mass., Dec. 19.—Leaning far out over the pulpit in Appleton Chapel, his long white beard and flowing hair making him look like a venerable patriarch, Dr. Thomas Abbott, in a sermon to Harvard students last night, broke away from the theology which may form the basis of the faith of millions of orthodox Christians and sounded the keynote of a new religion founded, not on the Bible, but on science and the out-reachings of the human heart.

"I wonder," he said, "if you students in Harvard will understand me when I say that I no longer believe in a cause. Tomorrow the newspapers will get hold of this and brand me as a heretic. My God is a great and ever-present force, which is manifest in all the activities of man and all the workings of nature. I believe in a God who is in and thru and of everything—not an absentee God, whom we have to reach thru a Bible or a priest or some other outside aid, but a God who is closer to us than hand or foot or blinker. Literature and history tell us that there is one eternal energy, that the Bible no longer can be accepted as ultimate, that the words of its laws were copied from other religions, that the Ten Commandments are but a springing fancy, that the law of Moses, but were, like all laws, a gradual growth, and that man is creature, not a creation.

"No thinking man will say there are many energies. The days of polytheism are past. There is only one energy. This energy has always been working. It is an intelligent energy.
