

will yet rise. At Usborne, a handsome brick church has been built, and opened in easy circumstances. A gracious revival has also been realized. We hope this Mission will soon become what it should be, a self-supporting circuit. Clinton, has not been left without manifestations of the Divine presence and power; the new churches built two years ago, are especially successful. The Mission is slowly progressing. At Colborne, a new church has been opened, free of debt, and another seated and finished; but in some respects the Mission has not much improved. Grey, has been revived, but is still unproductive. London, while having to mourn over the unfaithfulness and apathy of some, has rejoiced over the conversion of others. The excellent new church at Delaware, is quite a success, and the prospects of the Mission are good. Ingersoll and Dereham, amid anxiety, and labors more abundant, has improved. The elegant new church at Ingersoll, was opened under blessed influences. Since its opening, a good congregation has been gathered; and what is still better, a few souls converted to Christ. Cleveland, though not so prosperous as could be desired, is not without hope. At Orange and Chagrin Falls, a few have fallen in love with the sinner's friend; and other signs of progress appear. And we are happy to add, the stations in Ohio have this year been placed on the list of Circuits. Yorkville, while in much need of greater power from on high, rejoices in the possession of some, whose love for God is fervent and sincere; and under encouraging prospects, this Mission has also resolved to become self supporting. At Little Prairie, things are brightening, but we think it should be united to the Palmyra Circuit, to secure its permanent prosperity. Lisbon, has received the droppings of a shower. Rockland, has had to suffer from the sickness of its Pastor, the persecution of its opposers, and the removal of many influential friends. But hope brightens the cloud. A new Mission was opened on Lake Superior, at the commencement of the year, under favorable prospects; but a devastating fire has recently swept over the Town of Hancock, the chief town of the Mission, occasioning cloud and sorrow; but it is hoped the Station will rise above its difficulties, and become a very important and remunerative field. A new Mission has also been opened at Owen Sound, and its vicinity, where several of the children and families of our friends have removed. As yet, the people are poor, and can render but little pecuniary help; but we are hopeful of the future. The Missions on Prince Edward Island, are not looking so prosperous as in some previous years. Great depression has been felt in some parts of the Island; in one part so severe, as to necessitate the vote of relief from the Legislature to the people; for the purchase of grain. Amidst such circumstances, removals have been numerous, so that there has been numerical and financial
