## MAJORITY OF LOAN IS HELD BY UNDERWRITERS

LONDON, May 23.—Money and dis-  
count rates were quiet today. The  
stock market closed the week irregu-  
lar. Consols relapsed three-six-  
teenths on the news that the under-  
writers have been left with 80 per  
cent. of the \$15,000,000 New South  
Wales loan on their hands. Mexican  
bonds were good features and ad-  
vanced from one to three points, but  
the rest of the securities sagged under  
light liquidation.  
American securities opened quiet  
and unchanged. Later the list ad-  
vanced under the lead of Canadian  
Pacific and closed steady, with values  
from 1-8 to 1-2 above parity.

## SEVERAL COTTAGES AT WHITBY ASYLUM TO OPEN SHORTLY

Institution, When Finished,  
Will Be One of the  
Largest on the  
Continent

FIVE YEARS MORE  
TO COMPLETE WORK

Series of Cottages Will Form  
a Crescent Half a Mile  
Long—Environment  
Ideal

By a Staff Reporter.

WHITBY, May 23.—Mayor Willis of  
Whitby is in high spirits over two im-  
portant events. One is the announce-  
ment that the Ontario Government  
will shortly open several of the large  
cottage hospitals at the new provincial  
asylum for the insane, just west of  
the town. The other is that work has  
begun on the harbor improvements by  
the Dominion Government.

Speaking to The Toronto Sunday  
World respecting the new hospital,  
Mayor Willis said: "The institution  
will be one of the largest and most im-  
portant established by any provincial,  
state or federal government on this  
continent. The plans are on such a  
vast and comprehensive scale that  
altogether the work on the buildings was  
started two years ago. It will take five  
years to complete."

The series of cottage hospitals will  
form a crescent half a mile long. So  
picturesque is the site, and so symmetri-  
cal the design of the buildings, that  
the architecture and location will be  
picturesque by day, and when illumi-  
nated by the hydro-electric lights, like  
fairies' land, at night. There is strong  
evidence to believe that the success of  
the methods to be adopted at Whitby,  
with the ideal environment, will out-  
rival the success of the government's  
prison reform undertaken at Guelph.  
Rev. Father Ryan is soon to be the  
recipient of a fine new rectory. His  
pastorate is very popular and the  
members of the Roman Catholic  
Church in Whitby have contributed  
generously towards the erection of the  
rectory.

## VALUE OF COAST METAL INCREASES

C.P.R. Applying for Running  
Rights Over C.N.R.—  
Connect Red Deer.

The total value of the metalliferous  
minerals produced in the Coast dis-  
trict of British Columbia is as follows:  
The official records to be increasing to an  
important extent. By five-year  
periods it has been as follows: For  
1899-1903, \$2,148,256; for 1904-1908,  
\$4,264,525; for 1909-1913, \$7,270,495.

A news item lately published in  
British Columbia is as follows: The  
Kinnickoat Mines Co., operating the  
Bonanza copper mines in Alaska,  
controlled by the Morgan-Guggenheim  
syndicate, has decided to invest in  
the development of the coast district.  
This brings the total distribution since 1910 up to  
\$5,000,000.

The Canadian Pacific Railway Co.  
is stated to be applying for running  
rights over the Canadian Northern  
Railway from just east of Rocky  
Mountain House, where the lines of  
the two companies junction, west to  
the Brazeau coal mines, so that Red  
Deer, Alberta, expects to be by late  
next summer connected by both rail-  
ways with large coal deposits.

FLORENCE, Italy, May 23.—A  
Florentine art student, Pietro Rossi,

Rossi later confessed the crime. He  
said:

"I am a student at the Social Science  
Institute here and am 24 years of age.

my way home to Monte Pulciano in  
order to inform my family of my pre-  
dicament. On the train, however, I  
saw an old lady who apparently had  
one foot in the grave and to whom  
wealth could not mean much.  
"The sight of the well-dressed wo-  
man tempted me, and I attacked her  
I would not have tried to kill her if  
she had not screamed when I grasped  
her. I then lost my reason and  
fired." The accused is kept under close  
watch.

## DETECTIVE TELLS OF SAFETY METHODS

Bankers Hear William J.  
Burns at American Bank-  
ers' Association.

In his address to a group of Ameri-  
can's foremost bankers, William J.  
Burns brought out a number of inter-  
esting points. It was the occasion of  
the annual convention of the Ameri-  
can Bankers' Association. He spoke  
of the protective features of banking  
and emphasized the point that it is  
better to stop a crime before it is com-  
mitted than to wait until after it is  
done. With the co-operation  
of the bankers, he was sure that  
many crimes against banks could be  
eliminated.

He said: In order to do this it  
becomes necessary to educate those  
who prey upon banks to know and  
understand that those who seek to de-  
raud a bank will be brought to jus-  
tice, prosecuted vigorously regardless  
of who they are, and no compromises  
will be made. It is necessary that the  
bankers immediately report all of the  
depositions that are committed or at-  
tempted against their institutions by re-  
porting them direct to one of our offices  
and this giving us an opportunity to  
take prompt and vigorous action.

There are many other features  
which could be introduced by banks, having  
for their purpose the protection of  
their institutions. Every bank, should be  
equipped with a signal system, and  
equipped with a signal system, many  
of them large institutions, throughout  
the country, to find there has been no  
effort whatever made to have them  
equipped with a signal system. I mean  
by that, either the buzzer system or  
the light. Where the teller seeks to  
steal, he is notified by a signal system  
there ought to be a series of signals,  
which are tremendously interesting,  
and not allowed to become obsolete,  
but they should be worked every day,  
not only for the purpose of determin-  
ing whether or not they are in order,  
but in order to educate those belong-  
ing to the bank that they are there for  
a purpose.

There is one other feature entirely  
outside of that embraced in the pro-  
tective features of the American  
Bankers' Association that I think it  
is our duty to call to your attention,  
and that is the fact that there are traveling  
over this country

A number of Vultures  
seeking to prey upon banks by get-  
ting credit from the banks, either by  
being introduced by business men or  
in other ways, up in going out and  
taking a small institution that is well  
known in the community and arrang-  
ing to incorporate and re-incorporate and  
then borrowing money from the bank  
immediately thereafter, either lawfully  
or unlawfully, bringing about a situa-  
tion that makes it impossible for the  
bank that loaned the money to col-  
lect it. Only now, we have a case of  
this kind, where a man who has been  
traveling over the country, New York  
especially, doing just this sort of thing,  
but in a more elaborate way, has been  
discovered. The American Bankers' As-  
sociation has gone out of its way to take  
some action in this particular case,  
and I am sure that you will be an ex-  
ample of this man so that all may know him.

I want to call your attention, too,  
to the fact that it becomes very diffi-  
cult for us to succeed many times  
thru the refusal of the banks to  
prosecute in cases where they have  
been imposed upon. In many banks  
are under the impression that it is a  
reflection on their institution to have  
said that they accepted a bad cheque.  
Why, my friends, no man in this  
country is so astute but that he can  
be imposed upon. I may walk out of  
here and get my pockets picked. Out  
of here, I said (laughter), notwith-  
standing the fact that I ought to know  
all about how they do it. So it is with  
the bank. I tell you until we succeed  
in convincing each individual banker  
of the great necessity for

Prosecuting in Every Case  
you will never succeed in educating  
that class of people that I have just  
described, that it is dangerous and im-  
profitable to prey upon banking insti-  
tutions.

We will be glad indeed to do our  
part, but we are powerless unless we  
can get your co-operation. When you  
seek to bring that about it brings you  
back to the fact that in all your vari-  
ous communities it is part of your  
duty to see that you are not men-  
sured by prosecuting officers, not men  
sured by your politics or otherwise can  
be influenced, which we find is the case  
many times.

We are no longer bothered with the  
old professional forger. He is almost  
entirely eliminated. Today it is the  
thief who is preying upon the banks,  
many of them bright, cunning  
fellows, and that is the class of people  
who are so easily educated to know  
and understand that the bank is the

who raced his ship thru the ice of the  
North Atlantic when the stricken  
Titanic was calling for aid.  
The Alaunia is a splendid ship of  
13,400 tons, and will sail on the Lon-  
don and Southampton service of the  
company.

## CLOSE IS STRONG BETTER SENTIMENT

Prospects of Better Trade and  
Hopeful Mexican Outlook  
Responsible

The market closed strong. The bet-  
ter tone of today's dull stock market  
was ascribed in large measure to a  
more hopeful feeling regarding the  
Mexican outlook and the prospects of  
better general trade, as outlined by the  
mercantile agencies and other students  
of the situation.  
There were again some offsetting  
conditions, namely, alarming advices  
from abroad, particularly Paris, where  
the solvency of certain important bank-  
ing interests is being openly ques-  
tioned. The so-called market favorites  
made gains of a point or better, with  
a similar movement in some of the  
specialties. More gold was shipped to  
Paris and the movement of currency  
to the Pacific coast continued. Bonds  
were steady.

## WEALTHY WIDOW DROWNED HERSELF

Grief Over Death of Husband  
Caused Woman to Suicide.

MONTREAL, May 23.—Frau Stern,  
widow of the millionaire managing di-  
rector of the National Bank of Ger-  
many, who died last April, was found  
drowned yesterday in the River He-  
vel, near Potsdam, in Germany. She  
had gone out in a canoe. At the side  
of her husband's grave on the day of  
the funeral she declared she would  
not live long without him. Her friends  
thought she would conquer her grief,  
but the night before last she disap-  
peared from her palatial home near  
Potsdam, and was never seen again.  
Her only child, a son 14 years old,  
inherits the parents' great for-  
tune and one of the finest collections  
of paintings in Germany.

## FUSE'S FAILURE SAVED CITY'S WATER SUPPLY

Attempt Made by Suffragettes to  
Blow Up Glasgow Viaduct.

GLASGOW, May 23.—The failure of  
a fuse saved from destruction in the  
course of last night the aqueduct,  
which carries off half of Glasgow's  
water supply from Loch Katrine, 42  
miles away.  
A watchman while patrolling the  
aqueduct noticed some freshly turned  
earth. He made an investigation and  
discovered two powerful bombs with  
half burned fuses. In the vicinity he  
found a woman's handbag containing  
two towels, yesterday's issue of The  
Suffragette and a placard to the ef-  
fect that the proposed destruction of  
the aqueduct was a protest against the  
treatment of Mrs. Emmeline Bank-  
hurst.

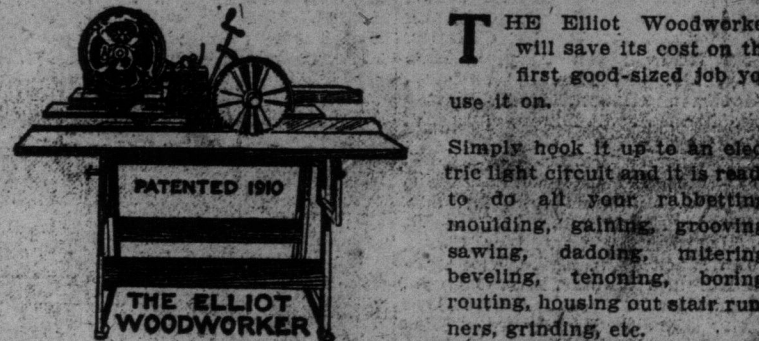
