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\$1,000 FIRE ON KING STREET

Dominion Express Company's Office Damaged by a Blaze This Morning.

A fire in the office of the Dominion Express Co. on King street this morning did damage to the extent of upwards of \$1,000.

The alarm was rung in from box 9 about 7:30 o'clock this morning, and the firemen were quickly on the scene.

The building is owned by Miss Barlow and Mrs. R. P. Clinch, and is insured for \$15,000 in the Royal Co. The office fittings, etc., are insured by the head office in Montreal under a blanket policy.

The stock in Hornbrook & Co.'s furniture store adjoining was seriously damaged by smoke. They are insured in the Equity and London companies for \$2,000.

Temporary front has been built on the express company's premises until new windows can be procured.

EMPRESS OF IRELAND ARRIVED THIS MORNING

Royal mail C. P. R. steamship Empress of Ireland, Captain Forster, arrived at her berth this morning from Liverpool via Halifax, at 7:45 o'clock.

All the C. P. R. and government officials went to Halifax to meet the steamer and came aboard in her from that place. The steamer arrived off Partridge Island shortly after midnight last night.

The voyage across was uneventful. A child died on board and was buried shortly after its death. Head winds were encountered all the voyage and fog prevailed during the last three days of the trip.
