Wiggins, Rev. E. W. Lester, Marysville; Rev. G. B. Trafton, St. John.

Rev. P. J. Trafton reported on the hotel at Riverside Camp (Me.), showing a balance of \$111. Rev. H. C. Arder reported on the earnings from rooms after the meetings, \$120. Mr. Archer was appointed recorder of the meeting.

It was resolved to invite Rev. W. D. Wilson, provincial prohibition officer, to speak on the prohibition question Friday.

In the evening Rev. E. W. Lester, of Marysville, preached.

## ANNUAL MEETING OF CENTENARY CHURCH

The total amount raised by Centenary church for last year amounted to \$12,500. This was made known at the annual meeting. As Sunday will be the last day for the Rev. W. H. Barracough as pastor, a resolution of appreciation for the work accomplished by him, within the four years of his service in the city, and regret on account of his departure was unanimously passed.

During the four years of Mr. Barracough's pastorate the membership of the church has increased from 427 to 540. One hundred and eleven have been received into the church on profession of faith and eighty-nine by letter of transfer. Thirty-five of the members have passed away, and seventy-three removed. This leaves a net increase of ninety-two.

The receipts for missions have increased \$600 in the four years, and now total \$2,372. Several societies have been organized. The Epworth League, Centenary Brotherhood, Ladies' Aid and the Red Cross Circle were organized, and all are actively engaged.

The following were elected representatives of the quarterly official board of the church: Mrs. Frank Skinner, Miss A. G. Hea, F. H. White, Chief Justice McKeown, W. E. Brittain, M. D. Austin, W. C. Jordan and P. W. Snider.

The resolution moved by Chief Justice McKeown, seconded by J. H. White and which received the unanimous support of the members, was as follows: "That this meeting of members of Centenary Methodist church desires to express its deep appreciation of the zeal and industry of the Rev. W. H. Barracough, B.A., who during the last four years has given to this church the fullest measure of service as its pastor, and whose work has been characterized by untiring industry and devotion on his part and has been productive of great and lasting benefit to those under his care to whom four years ago he was an entire stranger; and he further desires to convey to him and to Mrs. Barracough its keenest regret at their enforced departure and to wish for them a continuation of such harmonious and helpful relationship in every succeeding pastorate.

"And this meeting requests that the above resolution be placed upon the official records of the church."

## Asks Hotel Men To Co-operate

Aid Requested In the Conservation of Food

### The European Plan

Secretary of Main Food Production Committee Offers Suggestions for Economizing in Serving of Meals—Urges that Servants be Instructed

(Bangor Commercial.)

Augusta, June 28.—E. L. Newdick of Sanford, secretary of the committee on food production and conservation, in a letter sent out on Monday to the hotel proprietors of the state, asks their co-operation to assist in the campaign for food conservation along the strictest lines of economy.

Secretary Newdick makes the following suggestions at the request of the committee:

"Such facts as we are able to obtain show that practically all the hotels in the state have been conducted in the American plan. In order to secure a consensus of opinion of hotel proprietors, and to discuss possibilities of changes with the idea of economy, a conference was held June 7, to which all hotel men in Maine were invited. It was revealed at this conference that already several large hotels in Maine had adopted the European plan service in place of the American plan, with very satisfactory results, that the inauguration of the European plan meant absolute conservation of food, which seems to be necessary in the face of the present emergency; therefore, we urge you to adopt the European plan of service.

"Facts brought out at the conference and statistics from unquestionable authority, also showed that if persons on the American plan have to write out their orders they will not order in such quantities as when the order is given orally. Statistics at hand prove that the serving of 2,000,000 meals under the checking method resulted in saving 15 per cent of the food used in comparison with the oral order system.

"With little competition, you can readily understand that 15 per cent of the cost of your material used last year would mean considerable saving of food. If it is found to be absolutely impracticable to adopt the European plan, highly recommended to German submarine commanders of the sailings of allied and neutral vessels. well-known Norwegian captains engaged in the passenger and freight trade to British ports, on the charge of having given information to German submarine commanders of the sailings of allied and neutral vessels. They were arrested in Christiania.

"These captains, it was charged, obtained all the information possible about the departure of shipping and in the harbor, communicated with the German submarine commanders by secret signals. Wireless could

not have been used, as the messages would have been picked up by the allied warships on patrol duty.

When a submarine commander returned to his base in Germany and reported that he had sunk one of the steamships mentioned in the information supplied by the Norwegian captains, the intelligence department at Kiel paid the sum of \$80 to the informer.

The people in Christiania, where the two captains had been locked up for

forty days, the secret service agent said, were so infuriated against the informers that they would have lynched them if they could have broken into the jail.

The men were believed to have given information to the Germans which had caused severe Norwegian freight steamships to be sunk with loss of life. The elder of the two captains had been for twenty-five years in the North Sea trade and was about to take charge of a fine new passenger vessel. He is well known in shipping circles in Nor-

way, Sweden, Denmark, Germany, Holland and England.

The Norwegian said that he believed Norway was waiting for the United States to ask her to enter the war against Germany, and that the government would offer Christiania as a base for the allied fleets to operate against Germany in the North Sea.

He said that people were starving in Norway because of Germany's cutting off of food supplies.
