AMERICAN GIRL IS DROWNED IN PEARL LAKE AT KEMPTVILLE, N. S.

Yarmouth, N. S., August 4.—Eleanor Hendee, of New Haven, Conn., aged 18, was drowned at Kemptville yesterday afternoon. She and her small brother rowed into the middle of Pearl Lake and she jumped overboard for a swim. Becoming tired she attempted to get into the boat and her brother put out to help her, but she pulled it out of his hands. The wind blew the boat away and he could not handle it with the single oar to get back to her. She sank exhausted.

NEW YORK STREETS THREE FEET UNDER WATER

New York, Aug. 4.—Streets in New York city and suburbs were turned into yellow rivers, surface and elevated traffic was badly crippled, wires were blown into a tangled network, trees uprooted and hundreds of cellars flooded in a torrential downpour with a sixty mile gale.
