Halifax Exhibition Races.

Two Records Broken.
Louisville, Ky., Sept. 17—Two world records for trotting on half mile race courses, were broken in trials against time at the Kentucky state fair here yesterday. The mark 2:18 1/2 for a two year old trotting colt was lowered more than five seconds to 2:13 1/2 by Suldine, a bay colt by Worthy McKinney-Carletta. The colt was driven by H. D. Moody, of Lebanon, Ky., his owner. The other record to fall was that of 2:38 for a yearling when Moody's Verbens Ansel went the distance in 2:38.

STIRRING LETTER RECEIVED IN WOODSTOCK FROM BLACK WATCH

The following letter was received in Woodstock last week from a private in the 42nd Royal Highlanders, The Black Watch—

If my memory can take me back far enough I will try to give a brief account of our doings Sunday, May 2nd. Leaving the rest camp at 9:45 a. m. we marched about fourteen miles and reached B. — about 5:45. This is a small town absolutely in ruins. Our billet was over the G. P. O. It had no windows nor doors and the ceiling anything but watertight. It poured several times during the three nights we were there and we had simply to stand in part of the room where the water did not drop. Opposite the G. P. O. was a church. It is quite impossible for any one at home to picture its condition. Once it must have been a beautiful building; now, simply parts of the walls remain standing, organ, stained glass windows and statues smashed to atoms; grave-yard adjoining is a pathetic sight, tombstones torn up and in parts coffins and remains of bodies exposed.

From Tuesday till Saturday, 8th, we were in reserve line. I did twenty-four hours sentry duty on road leading to line. Saturday evening we retired to trenches about 1,200 yards from front line. These were three feet deep and we lay in bottom and slept as well as possible till 4 a. m. Sunday, bitterly cold; at 5 a. m. our artillery commenced a terrific bombardment, which lasted till 9:30 a. m. Our front line would be attacking the Germans about 6 a. m.

The order to advance reached us at that hour and this was done by the battalion at so many yards interval and by half platoons. Through fields we

reached our objective, 700 yards off. On the way we passed groups of wounded, those who could walk on their way to the dressing stations, and could see the artillery officers giving command to their gunners through megaphones.

Although working side by side all our fellows had their ears stuffed with wadding. Many of our fellows were wounded in the advance. I was beside a younger who joined us a few days previous, who had never been in action before. I kept joking all the while, although my thoughts were elsewhere. Later on in the day he was wounded though not seriously, and is now in England. I was very glad.

A second bombardment more severe than the first started. We were in the trenches and to support second battalion in front of us as soon as they got into the German trenches our officers volunteered to lead us but the general command would not give the order—the officers had faded badly. After the eighth we saw, all our boys were bitterly disappointed. It was a sight to see those gallant chaps going up to line—practically every one to die as a hero, and as they passed us to the front, such as, "The lang jump this time, lad, 'ere ye comin' to die as a hero." Since this attack the men of this regiment, the general and decorated for conspicuous bravery on the field.

We were relieved at 7 p. m. and marched to billets eight miles off. All I had to eat during this spell were three biscuits and a tin of jam.

Continuing our movements we left our billets and had a ten mile march to our present position. It is very hard marching. Roads are so uneven and in this hot weather with full equipment and ammunition it is no picnic. The British think, are using all transports for advance work.

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MORE MEN FOR PRINCESS PATS

Fourth University Company Now Preparing — Orders Issued For Organization in Montreal—How to Join

The universities of Canada have now for some time been working loyally together to reinforce that gallant regiment the Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry. Three companies have already gone overseas, numbering nearly 900 men and a fourth company is now under formation at Montreal.

The Universities Companies are now known throughout the length and breadth of Canada, so that there is a continuous flow of men of the right type to Montreal. Not only do such men find entry to a famous regiment but they are rapidly equipped and trained and sent without delay overseas to England, where they are comfortably billeted in huts at an excellent camp near the sea on the south coast of England. Moreover the men secure the great advantages of good comradeship with congenial spirits of similar tastes and antecedents.

The first company under a notable officer, Captain Gregor Barclay, has been declared by persons of experience to be second to none compared with any army in the world.

The second company was raised overstrength in seven weeks by Captain G. McDonald and Captain Percy Molson. Both companies are now in France.

The third company called eighty overstrength because the newspaper publishers of Canada were good enough to make known, through their columns that the company was being formed. This resulted in such a rush of recruits that it was necessary to apply to the militia council of Ottawa for a special authority to increase the strength from 250 to 350 men. Each man before embarkation writes to a friend who is a likely recruit and tells him of the advantages of the Universities Company, so that even before the men have disembarked a fresh company is assembling on the McGill campus at Montreal.

Recruits are examined locally by an army medical officer and are attested by a magistrate in the nearest city, after which an application is made for transportation, which is speedily furnished from Montreal.

This system is effective and rapid, and free from red tape. There are in nearly every city, representatives of the various universities who are always ready to help forward the good work, and to give information to men anxious to enlist.

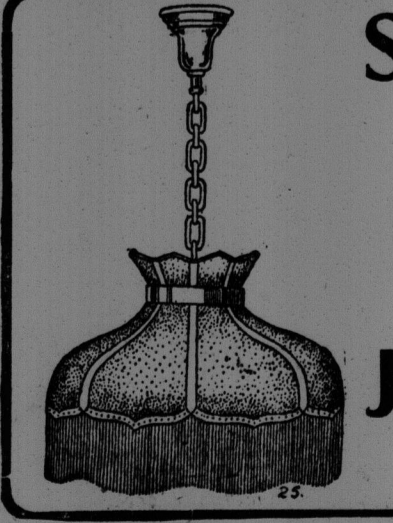
