

## HAVE TALK ABOUT THE PLAYGROUNDS

Association Decides to Keep  
Allison Grounds Closed  
Till Next Year.

The Allison Playgrounds, near Rockwood Park, will not be opened for use this year. This was the decision of the Playgrounds Association at its monthly meeting yesterday afternoon in the Health Centre. Frank T. Lewis, president, was in the chair. Miss Emma I. Heffer's report occasioned interesting discussion regarding the work of the Boys' Club for the coming winter. A. M. Belding, Miss Heffer and Mr. Lewis were appointed a committee to arrange for a physical male instructor to assist Miss Heffer and to prepare the club room over Victoria Rink for the winter's work.

L. M. Parquhar, the secretary, was requested to send letters of condolence to Mrs. A. C. D. Wilson in the death of her mother, and to Dr. G. B. Pest, whose father died this week. Mr. Parquhar reported having sent a letter to Mrs. James H. Doody to express sympathy in her recent bereavement in the death of her son in Los Angeles.

Mrs. George Dishart, treasurer, gave a satisfactory report on the finances. Among the money received were several dollars sent in by the children of the playgrounds at King George and West St. John. These children had the right spirit, Miss Heffer said, and always tried each summer to do something to help defray expenses for any extras they might require. They had done so this season very successfully.

Gratitude was expressed to those who had given prizes for the closings of the centres. It was said that the operation of the Allison ground at the South End and the Alexandra ground had not been successful this summer. The other grounds had been very successful and the spirit of co-operation had been very encouraging.

As the East End slide has been condemned by W. L. Harding, commissioner of public safety and the caretaker of apparatus, D. L. McRobert, as unsafe, the meeting requested the secretary to send notice to the East End Improvement League to whom the slide belongs, to have it removed, since supervision is not given there after the closing of the grounds in August.

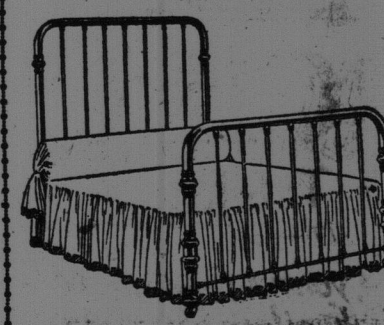

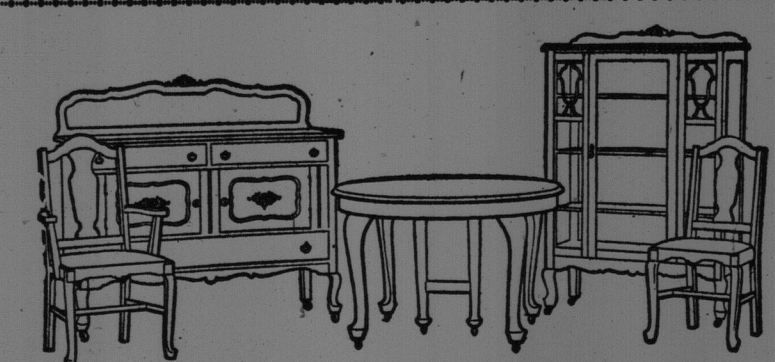

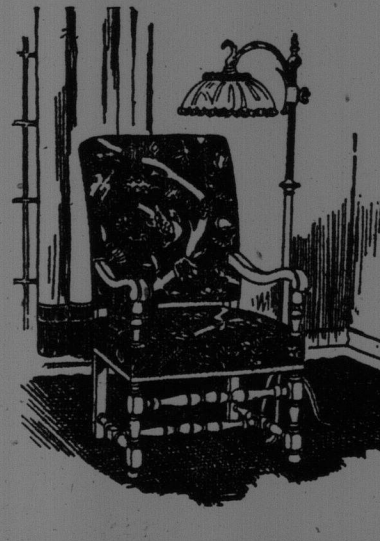
